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## Parking Gate History

Despite protestations of our campus beardo-democrats, an administrative body is not required to submit its decisions to a larger public for some gesture of approval. Rather, this body is held accountable to a superior body and this superior body may or may not be chosen by popular voice. Without evaluating the virtues of rule by mass opinion, one can still admit that the requiring of all administrators to seek direct public approval of all programs would stifle action to the point of stagnation. Nevertheless, when a program proves unworkable and/or unprofitable, it is the administrator's responsibility to evaluate alternative solutions to the problem and take corrective action. In this last respect, the installers of our parking gates are the just recipients of considerable public criticism. The ill-advised nature of the parking debacle is seen in chronological outline:

- 1. The Fall, 1966 conversion of the parking system was justified by the administration as a means of alleviating the shortage of parking spaces. No mention was made of insufficient revenues from the old system, and we were told Thursday that enough money was being taken in under the sticker system. At 10¢ per day, the gate system would be cheaper for most students and would be fairer, we were told.
- 2. In practice, the new system turned out to be an expensive (\$130,000) means of encouraging more people to park on campus in a smaller number of spaces.
- 3. Even under optimum operating conditions, the gates made for aggravating congestions going into the lots and leaving them. When the gates malfunctioned, traffic flow was further impeded.
- 4. The new system was not producing revenue at the anticipated rate.

Thus far we have a system that takes up needed parking spaces, amplifies problems of traffic congestion, is prone to mechanical failure, and is economically unprofitable. Some change was needed and the following alternatives appeared feasible:

> 1. Remove the gates, posts, chains, etc. and reinstitute the sticker system, writing the expenses of the venture off to bureaucratic mismanagement.

- 2. Remove the gates, et al, and temporarily raise the sticker fee to defray the expenses involved in installing and removing said obstacles.
- 3. Retain the gates and modify the system as follows:
  - a. The lots most convenient to campus could be entered through card-operated gates, stickers having been issued to prevent use of the cards for more than one car. Card cost: \$15 per semester.
- b. The remaining lots could be entered through coin-operated gates.

  Gate toll: 15¢ per day.

The decision to pursue a fourth alternative, changing only the amount required to operate the gates, seems as short-sighted and ill-advised as the original decision to install the gates. It is, in short, an administrative adjustment for an error in judgement. The fourth solution amounts to letting the students pay for some administrator's blunder. Any protests should be directed at the administrator's poor judgement and at subsequent attempts to appear blameless. Since there seems to be no way for the gate toll to remain at 10¢, energies could best be spent in promoting a solution which the administration can accept. they continue to insist that a 25¢ toll is the only solution, then a boycott of the lots appears to be the most effective means of convincing them that they are wrong.

Students are starting to organize because they feel the proposed parking lot fee increase is too high. They also rightly feel that they should have known what was being planned. Students resent being the subjects of arbitrary rulings from "above."
