

CAPT. ROBERT L. CARDENAS

was reported missing in action in the European area. Capt. Cardenas was in heavy bombers, and his group had been cited previously for bombing the Ploesti oil fields. (San Diego High.)



CAPT. ARCHIE WARREN CHATTERLEY

who has been credited with shooting down 7 enemy planes, is missing in the European area. A fellow pilot reported seeing him parachute from his plane,

apparently landing safely. Capt. Richard Butler who is back from England had reported seeing Chatterley recently at his base. (San Diego High.)

LT. GEORGE G. CRAWFORD

was shot down over Europe but is believed to be safe in an axis prison camp. He was bombardier in a Liberator unit stationed in Italy, and has been miss-ing since March 19. Axis short-wave radio reported him as a prisoner of war, but it seems that the report is still unofficial. (Herbert Hoover High.)

LT. EDWARD L. IMBLUM

seems to be missing in action according to a verified note on one of his News Letters which was returned. That is all we know. LCP. (St. Augustine High)

IST. LT. WILLIAM LANSILL

has been missing in action over Holland since April 8. He was first pilot of a

B-24. (Reading High, Pa.)

S/SGT. ROBERT ANKETELL

wrote from Italy as follows: "I also received a News Letter while I was in a hospital from a shell fragment wound. That was when I really appreciated it. I have been here for some time and have been in action on both fronts." (San Bernardino High, Calif.)

LT. LEROY A. MORGAN

who was navigator on the B-24, Fu-Bar, for 15 missions has been awarded the Purple Heart for stopping a piece of flak and also the Air Medal. He has been in a hospital in England. (San Diego High.)

CAPT. GEORGE C. (BENNY) ALEXANDER

has been decorated with the Purple Heart, the Air Medal with six Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Silver Star. He was given credit for knocking down an ME-109 on a mission to Catania, Sicily. (Coachella Valley High)

LT. THOMAS BRENT BURRELL

is back in the States following his experiences as bombardier over Europe, and he was one of those chosen to broadcast over a radio network from the Hal-Ioran Hospital, Willowbrook, N. Y. Brent has the Air Medal and the Purple Heart. (Herbert Hoover High)

LT. JOSEPH J. McCORMICK

has been in Italy since August and has flown 54 missions. He is hoping to come back to San Diego soon where Mrs. McCormick and a new son are awaiting him. The son was born March 12th. (Herbert Hoover High.)

LT. CHARLES CASTON

was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for outsanding action against the Japanese in the Marshalls. (San Diego High.)

The second

LT. JAMES T. JENNINGS

was on a ship the crew of which received a Presidential Unit Citation. (San Diego High.)

MAJ. ED OVEREND

who is flying with the Marines in the South Pacific has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross from the United States government, the Distinguished Flying Cross from the British government, and he has been made a member of the "Order of the Flying Cloud" by the Chinese government. (Coronado High)

LT. CLARENCE PETERSON

was awarded the Air Medal and an Oak Leaf Cluster for action in the South Pacific area. (Herbert Hoover High)

LT. COL. ORIN H. RIGLEY was on the radio program "We the People" some time ago. A copy of the program is too long to print here, but these are some of the highlights: He was in 19 months of constant action and saw the picture of American power in the Pacific change from a desperaote

defense to a high-powered offense. He was in 90 bombing missions and 570 hours of combat flying. His group was in all of the fights: "We've been fired on at Midway, Guadalcanal, Mun-da, New Georgia, Vila Le Veland, Bougainville to name a few . . . at Henderson Field after we had had fighters with us the first time, we were so gratefbul we gave the fighter squadron a party." IST LT. DONALD L. WEBBER

who was in the South Pacific last year flying fighters has recently been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and four Oak Leaf Clusters to the Air Medal. Don is about ready to go out again. (San Diego High)

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MAJ, EDWIN H, BREWER

was mentioned in a dispatch from Italy which said that he directed a Marauder bomber attack over railroad yards in Florence, Italy. The dispatch said that Brewer's group derailed or destroyed 120 of 170 railroad cars in the yards. (Sweetwater High)

LT. A. H. JOHNSON

is still in the Mediterranean area, and from a letter he wrote to some one else comes this note: "I used the Major's (probably Ed Brewer) brand new plane to

lead the squadron the other day, and when I got back it needed a new engine and a little patching up. He was a little browned up, so to speak, but he couldn't say much. They took a picture of the ship with a couple of hundred flak bursts in it. They also took a shot of my bombardier and me." (San Diego High)

IST. LT. ARTHUR J. PORTER

who pilots a B-26 Marauder in the Mediterranean theater had some exciting moments when another Marauder snipped off his bomber's tail. The bomber's propeller mowed into the tail section of Porter's plane bending the rudder. "We just made it home." **(San** Diego High)

LT. COL. ROBERT C. COZENS

paid the campus a visit. It is not often that we are honored by a Lt. Col., and since we are partial to Bob anyhow, it was a real treat. He reports that Robey is 13 months old and that he came back just in time to get acquainted with him while he is learning to talk. As an additional item of news, Bob completed 25 missions in B-17's, and it seems he was on some that were pretty rough: Kiel with bad losses, Schweinfurt with 60, and the shuttle raid over Regensburg with 59. "Last winter I spent in North Africa and nearly froze. This year the only snow I have seen has been on near-by mountains, and I can say I haven't experienced any weather more unpleasant than mud-begetting rains. Of course, you've read all about that in the newspapers and magazines. Judging from what I have read this war is being ad+ mirably and truthfully reported in story and picture and it's a pleasant feeling to know that the folks back home are getting an unbiased account of our lives over here. My favorite reporter in this respect, and I think this applies to most of the soldiers, is the inimitable Ernie Pyle, who has an uncanny talent for putting the real thoughts of the boys into print. I have often wondered how the things he writes get past the censors, but that's the beauty of our American newspapers.

"Have got to tune in now to the Gerpropaganda broadcast called man 'Jerry's Front.' I find it very amusing. It is a favorite with many of the boys in these parts with its MC, 'Sally,' a luscious-voiced announcer, and its naive attempts to show the American soldiers that the Nazis are after all a swell bunch of guys and will receive us with open arms when we finally get to their country." Pvt. Jack Goode is at Camp Roberts, California, where he was sent following ASTP. (San Diego High.)

Maj. Jack Bray is operations officer and test pilot at Lowry Field, Colo., where he has been stationed for 3 and a half years. S/Sgt. Robert A. Wade wrote from the Hq. of his bombing group in Sardinia:

"Frankly, at the moment I'm rather browned off at the army mail service, though I must admit that it is no new sensation with me. Reason: a recent letter from the folks tells of the April edition which features, among other things, a full page in color of the campus, and I have been sweating it out ever since.

"So after mail call yesterday, Art Porter calls up and asks if my News Letter had come—it hadn't. He went on to rave about it until my tongue was practically hanging out. But no matter, says I, it'll be here tomorrow. It wasn't. And to make matters worse, after I crawled into my sleeping bag last night, comes a rap on the door—and who is it but **Art Johnson** and **Don Lindstrum** who fly those bombers that I can't tell you the name of from practically around the corner.

"You guessed it—both of them had gotten their **News Letters,** and both of them raved about it. Art, Don and I had a short but hearty conversation, with plenty of 'did you hear that' and 'do you remember that,' etc., thrown in.

"For that matter, a reunion of reunions is shaping up in the Mediterranean area which will probably overshadow the recent eruption of Vesuvius. I'm referring of course to the day that Sheldon Campbell (Italy), Laurie Madalena (North Africa) and I (Sardinia) get together. I expect to see Campbell the latter part of the month, since I'm going to be in his general vicinity.

"Speaking of Aztecs, did I tell you that I saw **Eleanor Spinola** the last time I was in Italy? I had a flying tour of the southern part of the boot from Foggia to Naples. We went to the opera together and had a swell time reminiscing of the old things and comparing notes on the things we have seen over here. "The biggest news with me is about my house. Nearly the whole of the headquarters squadron is planning to build, building, or have built houses. Mine is in its second day of construction. It is 12 by 14 and houses three. I expect to be moved in by the end of the week. The Italians do a good job too. An architect tells me that you can't duplicate the work in the States for under two hundred dollars. One of the few advantages of foreign service.

"So you see, Doc, I'm a property owner. But I'll assure you, in case there is any doubt in your mind, I do not contemplate settling down here when the war is over.

"I hear from the Thief of Tunis (Chase) quite regularly, and he denies as a base canard that he is flying B-24's. He seems to prefer North Africa to the States—what have you people done to the place? Of course, he is in Texas, so I can't blame him. See you soon— I hope." (Herbert Hoover High.) Sgt. T. M. Rice wrote from his parachute outfit in England:

"Ran into Herman Addleson. He is stationed near here. I hope to run into quite a few Aztecs as I understand there are quite a few here. If they keep marking their planes with the old "Ugly" maybe I'll be able to spot a few. A parachute outfit had a gigantic track and field meet here in the dead of winter. It reminded me of the good old days when Walt Bean, Joe Roche, Jim Kinsella, Jim Brewer, John Macevicz, and Herman Addleson run cross-country on Ye Olde Aztec Speedway." (Coronado High.)
