To All of the Aztecs in Service and Their Friends:

This time it is Iwo Jima. Cotton Gilliland, Ted Thomey, Ross Workman, Chuck Ables, Jack Chandler, Bill Stoll, and Jack Edwards are there on the beaches, and dozens of other Aztecs are either on the beaches or in some capacity nearby. We cannot take our minds off of Iwo even though we know that the hazards of any of nearly a thousand other individual Aztecs may be as great. Aztecs in Germany, France, Italy, the Philippines and a hundred other spots should feel that they also are close to our hearts. We know that future months also will be rough, but in the meantime, let us hear from you after each of the current campaigns.

Many a fine letter had to be re-

duced to a single statement, hence the great extent of the WHO-WHAT-WHERE department. We try to include all of the names mentioned each month for it takes only a line to inform your friends that you are well. When we consider that the killed, missing, prisoners and the mustered out **Aztecs** (not including those incapacitated by severe wounds, combat fatigue and sickness) number over 200, our readers will appreciate the importance of a statement saying that YOU are well and carrying on.

For the 36th time we go to press, and believe it or not, it was the 36th time that was hardest. During the month many hundreds of yellow data cards came in bringing new names and addresses along with more information. (Keep sending them in, please.) There were more changes than ever before, and there were more casualties. Also, we started a new semester with more veterans to advise than before.

The three years of experience with the News Letter have meant a great deal to your editor. They have brought moments of greatest pleasure and satisfaction and also experiences such as can only be imagined in connection with the reporting of so many casualties among dear friends.

The next issue begins the fourth year with a special edition and a colored picture. And so for the 36th time, Best of luck!

LT. DENNIS R. CHAMBERLAIN

who was previously reported missing in action from a strafing mission in France has since been reported killed in action. The place was near Le Mans, France, and the date was August 3, 1944. He had flown a great many combat missions as a P-38 pilot and had two German planes to his credit. On his last mission he was last seen strafing an armored vehicle from low altitude.

CAPT. CHARLES W. DOWELL

who was previously reported missing in action over Germany has since been reported killed on November 21, 1944. Capt. Dowell was a P-51 pilot and had previously been awarded the Air Medal and the three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

PVT. FRANK J. GUASTI

who was previously reported missing in action, has been killed, according to his News Letter which was returned. It was marked "deceased" and also, it was verified.

Ist LT. RICHARD F. KATES

who was previously reported killed in action on his 47th mission, has since been reported a prisoner of the Japanese. Lt. Kates was leading a flight of B-24s over Borneo last Oct. 3 on what was to have been his last mission before returning to the States when his plane was shot down.

CPL. RAYMOND CRAIG POTTER

was killed in action while serving with the famous "Yankee" division of the Third Army near Luxembourg. He had been in action less than two weeks when his death occurred on January 16.

E CAPT. DONALD L. WEBBER

was killed in a plane crash at Dagget Field near Barstow, California. Capt. Webber was in charge of a flight of P-38's in gunnery practice when another plane crashed into his, killing both pilots. He had flown a very large number of missions in the South Pacific and had been awarded the Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

CAPT. JOHN E. ABBOTT

was reported missing in action in France. He had been awarded the Bronze Star for Meritorious Service during assault on the enemy. Capt. Abbott was at State College in 1939 and had graduated from West Point in 1943.

TE CAPT, RICHARD W. BURCH

is missing in action from a bombing mission over Germany. Capt. Burch has been awarded the Air Medal and the Oak Leaf Cluster.

PFC. EDWARD W. CREEKMUR

who had been reported missing in action in France on November 15, has since turned up in a hospital in France. His mother, Mrs. Albert S. Creekmur of 4030 Chamoune St., had received no word of him other than that he was missing, when along came a letter by him and dated January 7:

"Mom, I've had some bad luck, but I'm going to be as good as new although they tell me it will take a little time.'

SGT. WILLIAM DEEBLE

who was reported missing in action at one time, has since turned up. He was behind enemy lines for five days in the Luxenburg area.

LT. DAVID GUNN

was reported missing from a bombing raid over Borneo on December 30. He has since been returned to military control without injury according to a War Department report to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred J. Gunn, 1829 Granada Ave. Lt. Gunn pilots B-25's. His brother, Sgt. Dwight Gunn, is with the infantry in Europe.

LT. GEORGE E. HAMMOND

is missing in action according to the following note from his mother, Mrs. S. T. Hammond, of 3473 Monroe Ave., San Diego:

"My son, Lt. George E. Hammond, has been reported missing in action in Germany since December 16, 1944. He was on the front lines near St. Vith when the Germans made their breakthrough.

"He served with the 251st CA(AA) in Hawaii and in the Fiji Islands.'

LT. HOWARD E. McBRIDE

has been reported missing in action from a B-29 mission in the Pacific. Howard was a navigator and had been based in the Marianas. (He was the blonde fellow who played the comic

role in "Admetus" back in about 1940. LCP.)

LT. DONN DEMARCE

who was previously reported missing in action over Europe, is now a prisoner of war in Germany. Lt. DeMarce had flown at least 30 missions as co-pilot of a B-24.

LT. JOHN MEGREW

is still a prisoner of the Japanese. His mother, Mrs. George W. Megrew, wrote on February 12 from Rancho Santa Fe, Calif.:

'About three weeks ago for the first time in 13 months, we had three pris-oner of war cards from John. He was still at Cabantuan. Since his name did not appear in the list of men rescued from that camp, we believe that he was removed from there before the rescue. The cards bore a fairly recent date, July, 1944. Thanks for your interest in him. Sincerely, Mrs. George W. Megrew.'

LT. WILLIAM MILTON

who previously was reported missing in action has since been reported a prisoner of war in Germany. His address was Stalag Luft 3, but probably he is not there now. Recent newspaper reports either said or indicated that those American prisoners were moved westward from Sagan in advance of the Russian drive. Also, it seems that the men had to travel on foot.

Lt. Milton wrote his parents that he was "fine and fit as a fiddle." He is a P-38 pilot and was shot down over Germany on October 6.

We had a message all fixed up for Lt. Richard Kenney who was in Stalag Luft 3, but it seems that none of you is apt to see him there. The news has just come out that the Russians have occupied Sagan and that the prisoners had been moved westward. The item stated that they had been walked out. Richard had been asking about Eddie Searl. He didn't know that Eddie had been killed in China long ago. It has been rumored that Eddie's brother who was a prisoner of the Japanese, has been released in the Philippines. Nor does Richard know of the greatness of his brother-in-law, Commander William A. Dean, whose picture was on the front of Life and other magazines. Bill Dean commanded the squadron that had about the best record of any in the Pacific.

If any of you have the misfortune to see Lt. Kenneth Barnhart, Jr., tell him that all is OK with his parents and that Donald is doing fine also. Give all the prisoners our best wishes. LCP.

PFC. HARRY N. BARNET

who was previously reported wounded has been transferred to a hospital in England. He suffered shrapnel wounds in the left hand and arm. He has high praise for the men in the Medical Corps who administer blood plasma and penicillin as they got to him at the right time.

SGT. RAYMOND M. BERRY

was wounded in action while fighting in Gen. Patton's army. He is in a hospital in France. His wound is in the arm.

LT. BARNEY CARMEN

who was previously reported wounded in the Western Pacific wrote from a hospital in Hawaii:

'Was slightly 'incapacitated' so I haven't been able to write. I had a little run-in with a 'suicider' and he had a plane—one with meat balls on it and I didn't even have a water pistol.

"Kidding aside Doc, I'm finally walking a little all by my lonesome, and as soon as I can get around well enough by myself, it looks as though I'll head for the States. They told me they have done all of the skin-grafting they are

going to do out here. "I'm going to ask to go to the San Diego hospital and hope to get it. It'll be a great day-Dolores is all ready to jump on the train from Minnesota the minute she gets word from me.

"Think I'll start an active chapter of Omega Xi here—they seem to be tak-ing over the Pacific. Bill Bartlett, Willie Wynne and Andy Bofinger (all lieutenants j. g.), Lt. Johnny Peters, USMCR, and Lt. Ralph Monsees, USMCR, all came into the room on Xmas day, and did we have a bull session!! The next day Jim Avery came up."

LT. CHARLES R. FAUST

is convalescing in the Fourth Air Force Regional hospital at Hammer Field, Fresno. He is a B-24 pilot and expects to return to Lemoore AAF for reassignment.

PFC. LEONARD FIERRO

was wounded in Germany while serving with the Infantry. He had been in the same squad as James Leisure.

LT. RALPH M. FINNERTY

has six shrapnel wounds which he now is hoping will be good for a trip home. Previously, Lt. Finnerty had been wounded by a bullet in his leg in the New Guinea campaign. He is in a hospital in the Philippines.

LT. COL. JACK HAYS

has been awarded the Purple Heart and the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Distinguished Flying Cross. He is now flying P-47s in the ETO.

CPL. TUFFIE HASHEM

is in a hospital in the States. He made most of the landings between Africa and Europe and was wounded four times, the last time quite seriously. He will have a new jaw when he comes out this time.

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CPL. JOHN A. GREGORY

landed in a hospital in England following what he called an "educational tour of the continent-and boy, did those Krauts educate me!"

He was flown from Paris to the hospital in England.

LT. GEORGE W. HELLER, USNR. has been reported wounded.

PFC. FRANCIS X. KING

was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds suffered in France on November 16, 1944.

"I am back with the outfit again after having been wounded a couple of months ago. Now that I am back, I'm glad the weather has improved.

While I was in the hospital I met a fellow, also wounded, from San Diego. His name is Henry, and he attended State part time last year. I have been putting my college French to use, but at our present location the natives all speak German."

LT. JOHN PETERS, USMCR

who was badly injured in a maneuver in the Pacific, is in a hospital in the States.

PFC. RAYMOND A. POWER

who was previously reported wounded, had been injured by a piece of sharpnel which pierced his leg while in France last Nov. 16. He was sent to a hospital in England and expects to be in combat again soon.

SGT. TOM RICE

was wounded at Bastogne. He was one of the paratroopers who jumped on Dday along with Herman Addleson and Guy Sessions.

PVT. DANIEL W. ROBINSON

was awarded the Purple Heart for a shrapnel wound he received while on duty in Italy with an infantry division. Apparently he is well and is back with his outfit.

SGT. GUY SESSIONS

who jumped with the paratroopers on D-day in France and who did a great deal of fighting after that, is in Torney Hospital at Palm Springs. He was brought back on a ship and then across the country on a hospital train. He is in a cast with traction and weights.

T/SGT. BEN SIEGEL

was wounded in action in Europe. He was in Gen. Patton's army.

LT. COMDR. GEORGE B. WORTHINGTON

lost the sight of his right eye and will be returned soon. He was air combat intelligence officer on a carrier and was at Luzon, along the coast of Indo-China and at Formosa. He holds the Legion of Merit, awarded 10 days before he was wounded.



LT. (JG) SAMUEL DAVID ASKENAIZER

is at the NAS, Corpus Christi. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and his squadron was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for their work in the Pacific.

MAJ. ROBERT I. BACHRACH

is on a new assignment at AAB, Greenville, S. C. For his outstanding services in the MTO, he was awarded the Air Medal and 3 Oak Leaf Clusters. the Distinguished Flying Cross and a personal Presidential Citation. He was also awarded the Star of Africa decoration which is British.

CAPT. RICHARD L. BATES

was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in Belgium.

IST LT. J. A. BLACKSTOCK, USMCR, was awarded the Air Medal for his

combat service as pilot and division leader of a fighter squadron in the Pacific.

CAPT. HAROLD W. D. BAKER

is at Santa Ana for reassignment. He was a pilot with the Fifth Bomber Command and completed 44 missions with 150 combat hours in the Southwest Pacific. He has the Air Medal and the Oak Leaf Cluster.

Ist LT. ROBERT E. BEDWELL

who is now at Victorville, has had the Presidential Unit Citation added to his list of decorations. For his 50 missions in the ETO, he had previously been awarded the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

COL. JASPER N. BELL

was recently awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. He was in Puerto Rico and Brazil for two years and in the CBI theater for 20 months. They are expecting a new addition to the family in April.

CAPT. ARTHUR BRINDLEY

has been awarded the Bronze Star for his services in Europe. He is now in the Luxembourg area.

Ist LT. FREDERICK E. BULLOCK

has been awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Distinguished Flying Cross for his services in the MTO.

LT. GORDON C. CHAMBERLAIN was awarded the Air Medal for his serv-

ices as a glider pilot with the First Airborne Army. He was in on the invasion of Normandy and Holland.

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LT. RICHARD L. CORMIER, USNR was credited with shooting down four planes in a foray over Luzon on December 14th. He was with a Hellcat group that destroyed 20 out of 28 enemy aircraft without receiving a scratch.

LT. WALLACE L. CRISWELL

has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross in Burma. He also has the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster for his 400 combat hours. He is a pilot for a troop carrier squadron.

LT. DOUGLAS A. FAULKNER

has been awarded the Air Medal for missions flown in the Pacific. He has flown 26 and for a time had a rest in Australia. He is back at his base now.

LT. COL. JOHN E. FITZGERALD has been awarded the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross. Jack was the pilot who flew the first Mitchell Bomber from the aircraft carrier Hornet during the preparation for the raid on Tokyo back in 1942.

LT. JOHN R. GABRIELSON, USNR, who is still with a squadron, FPO, New York, has been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation.

CPL. ROBERT B. HARLAN

was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for taking part in the invasion of Normandy on D-Day. The outfit took part in three great airborne assaults, the other two being on Southern France and Holland. They were also active over enemy lines in the re-supply of trapped Allied units during the peak of the recent German counter-thrust.

S/SGT. JOHN O. HULL

has been awarded the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Presidential Unit Citation. He has the European Theater Ribbon with two battle stars. He completed 50 combat missions on major targets one of which was the first shuttle run to Russia. Now he is stationed at AAF, Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Ist LT. DONALD H. JAMES

has been awarded the Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

LT. ROBERT B, JAUREGUI

flew eight missions as a co-pilot of a B-17 based in England. He has been awarded the Air Medal.

LT. (JG) FRED JENNINGS

is still out in the Pacific. The submarine on which he is serving has been awarded a second Presidential Unit Citation.

CAPT. DAVID H. LEWIS, USMCR

was awarded the Bronze Star Medal "for heroic achievement in action against the enemy while commanding a Marine rifle company on Guam." He took command of landing operations on the island after his commanding officer was killed. He was cited for "skill, leadership and utter disregard for his own safety at all times."

Ist LT. DAVID R. MAYES

who is now at Douglas, Arizona on limited service following his injury by gas explosion, has received some additional decorations. He has the Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the Presidential Unit Citation. He has the MTO ribbon with two stars.

C. THOMAS McGRAW, A.S.,

has been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation. He was in on the early Guadalcanal campaign and later in the New Guinea campaign. Now he is in V-12 at 1210 W. Michigan St., Milwaukee, Wis.

MAJ. RALPH B. MILLER

is with a foreign transport group, MAAF, Miami, Fla. He has been awarded the Air Medal and the Presidential Unit Citation with two Oak Leaf Clusters. Ralph formerly was with the old 19th Bombardment Group along with the Suzy-Q. Major Harold C. Mc-Auliff is the other Aztec from that group. He is now at 1631 Mt. Eagle Pl., Alexandria, Va.

LT. RALPH R. McQUAID, USNR

was awarded a second letter of commendation for his services in the South Pacific where he was stationed for 25 months on active combat duty. At present he is assistant operations officer at Camp Kearney.

MAJ. ARTHUR F. O'KEEFE, USMC has been awarded the Air Medal and the Presidential Unit Citation. Major O'Keefe was one of the very first pilots to land on Henderson Field in 1942, and he has since had a tour of duty back in the States. Now he is an Air Officer at headquarters of the Fourth Marine Division.

Ist LT. THOMAS W. QUEEN

has been awarded the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters. He is a fighter pilot in England.

Ist LT. CHARLES M. ROTZLER

shot down his 7th German plane recently. He is a P-47 pilot and has taken part in some of the greatest aerial battles fought over Germany.

Ist LT. ARTHUR W. RUFF

is back from the European Theater where he was a lead navigator in B-17s and B-24s. He was awarded the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Presidential Group Citation. He also wears two Bronze Stars for the ETO.

LT. (JG) HERBERT TOMPKINS, USNR has been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for his work as a fighter pilot in the Pacific.

S/SGT. RICHARD G. WRIGHT

is still in the MTO. He has been awarded the Purple Heart, the Presidential Unit Citation and the Oak Leaf Clucter with the latter decoration. He was in the Battle of France and the Battle of Germany and has been in both the ETO and the MTO.

OPEN HOUSE

for the picture panel showing the Aztecs in Service will be held on Sunday afternoon, April 8, from 2:30 to 5:00. It will be a Little Reunion, and all Aztecs, both in and out of service, and their friends are invited to come. Service men on leave are especially invited to come. The third award went to **Ruth** Stephens for her work in 1944 in indexing the whole first volume of the **News** Letter, and for her work at typing addresses and on the picture panel. To the above three should go the congratulations of many thousands of Aztecs for their choice of endeavors in the total war effort. And may we make further awards until the war is over. LCP.

Lt. David Mayes is still at Douglas AAF, Arizona, where he expects to be awarded the Mexican Border Campaign ribbon soon.

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Pfc. Jerry Patrick is in Germany fighting along the Moselle River. He wrote that they were fighting Germany's best troops—the SS Panzers. He said that they were good but no better than we are. The weather is cold. "Every house here is built with the idea of it being used as a pill box if the need be." Sgt. R. W. Mossholder wrote from his B-29 outfit in the Marianas:

"Flew over Iwo Jima on my first mission. Have also had the fortune, or misfortune, to see a few of the cities of Japan. Tokyo is a large city, larger than I had any idea it was. Got a picture of Fujiyama, but had to ruin it by taking another picture over the top of it. Guess I'll have to go back and take it again. I saw some pretty good fires started in some of their cities.

"I think that the American people as a whole underestimate the Japanese and their planes. I don't think they have as good planes as we do but they do have good planes and pretty good flyers. When they are over their homeland they fight like fury, even ramming at times. I did see one of them ram one of our planes, and he really put a hole in the side of that plane."

Lt. Noel Bickham wrote from the Aleutians:

"The only way I become orientated on the war is via the radio, magazines and the **News Letter.** I am in an outfit in which most of the officers are from Florida. I need a few loyal Californians to back me up occasionally. My main item of interest (to me) is that I would like to see my wife and son very much."

Lt. (jg) Joseph Seminario, USNR, wrote from his cruiser in the Pacific:

"I have an idea there was a little misunderstanding somewhere along the line because I was not wounded as was stated in the 34th **News Letter.** I did puncture an artery in my head but that was just a small accident which happened here on the ship. I would appreciate it very much if you would help me kill the story as it has been just a bit embarrassing.

"Since the Normandy days we have been received as the victorious liberators. Never in our lives will we experience such mass appreciation. The feeling was mutual as we admired their fortitude during the occupation.

"On our way to Paris, the people gave us everything including the kitchen sink. Cider, cognac, flowers, tomatoes, apples, bread, and everything that they hold dear. Paris was liberated on Friday night, and we entered at sunrise next day. Paris was glowing with fight and fury, barricades and snipers. Lots of street fighting, but in a couple of days all of that was a thing of the past. Every day something new started. Peace and order were re-established. The renaissance of Paris is the most amazing thing I have ever witnessed. The speed of it was startling. The food supply came in and Parisians fed the population, the 'Metro' began service, movies opened, then the theaters, the opera, and Paris with its sidewalk cafes was again on its own.

"Now Paris has become a GI city. All GI's are amazed at this jewel. Paris is going smoothly on wheels, but relatively few saw the mobs fighting the FFI's, catching snipers, Frenchmen killing collaborators (after being judged), the hair cutting of **'chaise longue'** blondes, and the general cleansing of their institutions.

"During this crucial period, I lived very close to the people in their homes, work and entertainment because of my work in Civil Affairs. For several weeks I saw them acquire their liberty. They had almost forgotten what it feels like to be free. My friends ranged from 'le concierge' of our Maire to Marcel Denfert, head of the Paris Underground: from Renee 'la chanteuse' of Montmartre to Georgette Denis de l'Opera; from a broken down Montparnasse painter to Picasso; from Paulette de Opera Comique to Edwige Feuillere of the French movies.

"This conglomeration of important and interesting people in a place where it is so easy to meet and befriend them was more than one could ask. It would take books to tell everything that can happen to a soldier in Paris, especially this frantic Paris.

"I left Paris some time ago but the memories are still intense. I am now attached to the First French Army. It's nice to be with them and better yet when my relatives live a few kms. away from my billet. I spent Christmas and New Year's with them and have been with them every week end since. It's so nice to be with my people whom I had not seen for years. Today we went to Switzerland, and in the near future I am planning on going to my former home in Neuchatel on the other side of the Jura."

"The B-29s are in the limelight right now. It is a sort of good feeling to know however that we helped to make those bases in the Marianas possible. It doesn't seem possible that back in May I bombed Guam and now we are in possession of Leyte (and Mindoro and part of Luzon and are running right

up to the China coast-as of yesterday). Last November (1943) it seemed as though it would take five years to get there.

Lt. Frank Heryet wrote from Saipan:

"The only other Aztec I have seen here is Lt. William Westbrook. Living conditions are better than I expected they would be, but I sometimes wonder

why I didn't join the Navy. 'Have recently found out that helmets sometimes have other uses besides being used for shaving and laundry. We sometimes have to wear the things. The Japs have been pulling some raids since the B-29s are here, and we have logged some foxhole time. Have seen a few planes shot down. One landed a couple of hundred yards from my foxhole.

'I was on the first B-29 raid on Tokyo and have been on two since.

Haven't been on a mission for three weeks. A crew from another squadron borrowed our plane for a raid and they didn't bring it back. We are getting a new plane ready to fly.'

"Safe and sound after the Lingayen campaign. Though there is much to tell it will have to wait. We are still in a rather hot spot. The 'bogies' what sleep

we might normally get. "All our moving around has meant that we got no mail since October. We are expecting mail at any time, and here's hoping there will be a News Letter among the letters."
