A hilarious time was had by all, and Seniors and Alumni jointly shared in the profits, which will run close to \$200. Credit goes to Florence Officer, Senior president, and her committee, and to Alumni Sol Schultz, Richard Woolley, Al Bradt, Pat Allard and Melvin White.

On May 13 the Alumni Association helped to sponsor a free baseball game at Lane Field between the Naval Repair Base and the championship Aztec team. A crowd of nearly 4000 enjoyed the entertainment provided by the Aztec band, fire dancers, cheer leaders and song leaders, and the Navy band, as well as watching State add another victory to its list. Again credit goes to **Bob Brietbard**, Athletic Chairman, for a job well done.

On May 22 the Executive Board gathered for a dinner meeting, at which a partial report on the dance was approved. A final report was to be made May 31, but it is known that advertising from the Souvenir Program covered all expenses.

Later that evening there was a general Alumni meeting at the County Schools Service building. Decision was made to hold general meetings of the Alumni Association on the third Monday of each month, with the exception of July and August; the first monthly meeting will be held June 17 at 7:00 P. M. at Scripps Cottage.

# News of Aztecs Still In the Service

LT. PFAEFFLE (KIRK) SIMPSON, JR. USN

was killed at Jacksonville, Fla., on May 9, in the crash of a dive bomber he was piloting on a routine mission. Lt. Simpson, son of **Mr. and Mrs. Pfaeffle Simpson**, 4445 50th St., San Diego, had attended State College from 1938 to 1940, and was graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1943. He was a veteran of South Pacific warfare.

In addition to his parents, Lt. Simpson is survived by his widow, Mrs. Shirley Simpson, and a daughter, Sherry Jean, residing in Jacksonville, and a sister, Jean, of San Diego.

Lt. John R. Watson has been discharged after long service with an Army aviation engineers' outfit (the 1884th) that participated in missions at Angaur in the Palaus, Guam and Okinawa. At Angaur his outfit went in on D Day with the 81st Division and built an airstrip in 21 days. On Okinawa, fighting was still in progress while they helped to build the famous Naha airstrip.

John, a former Aztec basketball manager, holds the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with two stars, and also has the meritorious unit service award. He plans

to return to college.

A veteran of extensive PT boat warfare in the Pacific, Lt. (jg) Haile Chace has been released after three years of service in the Navy. He served as an executive officer and commanding officer of PT boats in Squadron 33, which operated against Japanese shipping from New Guinea to the Philippines. One PT boat on which he served was credited with assisting in sinking a Japanese destroyer. Chace plans to enter Cornell University to continue his study in dramatics.

Dr. Franklin Walker, former member of the English department faculty at State college and later chairman of the English department at University of Oregon, has accepted appointment to the Morrison chair of American Literature at Mills College. Before he takes over one of the three endowed chairs in American studies at Mills, however, Dr. Walker has some important work to complete for the Army. Recently advanced to the rank of major and awarded the Army Commendation ribbon, he has been named on Gen. Kepner's staff as technological historian for the Air Forces' participation in the atomic "Crossroads Project". This means he will spend the summer in the Pacific.

Pvt. Dick Barnes, who was drafted

shortly after leading the Aztec basketball team through a successful 1945-46 season, can be reached at this address: Co. A., 17th Bn., 5th Reg., Fort Mc-Clellan, Ala. He was high point man on the basketball team and was chosen most valuable player.

Lt. William E. Self '42, whose wife, Jean, is president of the Alumni Association, is still in the Philippines and in Manila recently he saw two other Aztecs, Lt. George (Killer) Ellis and Lt. John C. Swift.

Lt. E. Scofield Bonnet, Ex-41, was discharged from the Army Air Corps Reserve in August, 1945, but only recently informed the News Letter of his wartime activities. He trained A.A.C. cadets for nearly two years as a civilian instructor, and then joined Consairway, flying Liberator Expresses for the Air Transport Command. While flying for Consairway he made 25 round trips to Australia, New Guinea and Manila, P. I. All in all he flew four years and four months and piled up nearly 3300 flying hours, which must put him well up among the leaders on the Aztec flying log.

Lt. (jg) Donald DeLauer, the former basketball star, has been transferred from North Island and is now on duty at the Naval Air Technical Training Center, Memphis, Tenn. His younger (but considerably larger) brother, Bob, a member of the National Pro Football

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#### COMDR. YOUNG HONORED

Award of the Navy's Commendation Ribbon to Comdr. Carl H. Young, State College physical education department member who has served for four years at the Navy's Pre-Flight School, St. Mary's, Calif., was reported in a recent issue of The Eaglet, St. Mary's Pre-Flight weekly publication.

The award, accompanied by a citation signed by Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal, was made by Capt. Woods, commanding officer of the Pre-Flight School. The citation:

For outstanding performance of duty as Officer-in-Charge of the Mass Exercise Program, Navy Pre-Flight School, St. Mary's College, Calif., during World War II. In addition to organizing and administering an effective Mass Exercise Program, Comdr. Young voluntarily developed and conducted a project for the Convalescent Rehabilitation of sick and injured Naval Aviation Cadets with such uniformly good results that it was subsequently extended to three other Navy Pre-Flight Schools under his guidance. Because of his skill and vision, many otherwise physically disqualified Aviation Cadets were restored to duty in a short time and ultimately served as Naval Aviators in combat against the enemy. Comdr. Young's inititiative and loval devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the United States Naval Service."

# Sports Roundup.

#### LATE SCORES

San Diego 2, Naval Training Center 0. San Diego 3, College of Pacific 7. San Diego 5, College of Pacific 2.

If the San Diego Padres want a tip on how to win ball games, they might drop around and watch San Diego State's classy horsehiders, who have racked up 26 triumphs in 30 starts, and are winding up what Coach Charlie Smith figures is about the best season his willow wavers ever have experienced.

The Aztecs, who took the coveted California Collegiate Athletic Association title by winning 11 of 12 conference outings, are currently on another of those win streaks, having copped their last nine games, as this was written, and were to finish the season against College of Pacific in a doubleheader May 25.

In their toughest tilt recently the Aztecs outlasted Whittier College in a 14-inning marathon, which First Baseman Don Smith's single, scoring Third Baseman Don Brorson, decided, 5 to 4. Lanky Jim Gleason went the route for State, giving up 12 hits and pitching

13 scoreless innings.

Although Fresno State paced the CCAA team hitting with a .292 average. San Diego was second with .273, and led the fielding with .956. Center Fielder Mickey Aguirre was the outstanding batsman of the circuit, whacking away at a .415 clip, collecting 22 hits in 53 times at bat, erring just once in 20 chances, and getting credit for 16 runs batted in. Second Baseman George Caswell was second on the Aztec squad in conference play, hitting .303, and First Baseman Les Cassie was third with .333.

#### Steele Sets Record

When you talk about State's track team you only need two words to describe it, almost-Willie Steele. The loose-jointed Aztec Negro ace climaxed the season by demolishing the CCAA broad jump mark with a 24-foot, 10-inch leap in the conference trackfest at San Jose May II. as State finished third hehind Fresno State's 67, San Jose's 64, with 21. Santa Barbara was last with 15.

In the all-conference, Tom Rice took the two-mile, State's only other blue ribbon. Later, May 18, Steele won the broad jump at the West Coast Relays at Fresno, soaring 25 feet, 5/8 inches. Both his efforts set Aztec school records, eclipsing Leland McPhie's 24-foot, 7-inch standard.

State lost to San Jose 831/2 to 471/2. and to Santa Barbara,  $69\frac{1}{2}$  to  $60\frac{1}{2}$ , in a triangular meeting at Santa Barbara April 27, as Bill Ludwig ran a first-

place deadheat with Santa Barbara's Wally Cole in the mile, Tom Rice took the two-mile run in the fast time of 10:07, and Steele annexed the broad jump at 23 feet, 93/4 inches.

A week later in a night meet with Los Angeles Athletic Club's Mercuries in Balboa Stadium, the Aztecs were beaten, 70 to 60. It was the last C. E. Peterson-coached team to appear locally, and ended 25 years of cinder-path mentoring for the Dean. Next year, Bill Terry, football coach, will handle the tracksters.

Plans are under way now for Steele to compete in the L. A. Coliseum Relays (he's been invited), May 26; in the Pasadena Games, May 31; in the Compton Invitational, June 7; the NCAA at Minneapolis, June 21-22, and the National A. A. U. at San Antonio, June 28-29.

Minor Sports Report

In the minor sports the Aztecs had a so-so year, not bad and not too good. Jack Rising took third low gross honors, and Carl Stromer fifth, in the minor sports carnival at San Jose May II, to lead the State linksmen to second place.

The Aztec netmen, led by Howard Smith, first singles star, took third in the CCAA, but had a successful season, winning five dual match series, losing just two and tieing one. They beat Camp Pendleton, 6-2; Loyola twice by 7-0 scores; Santa Barbara, 6-0, and Naval Air, 4-2, in their windup duel May 21. Besides Smith, other Aztec netters were Eddie Brown, Roy Short, George Holland, Howard Roche, and LaVerne

Spring football wound up May 8 with Coach Terry sending the 40-man squad through the usual last-day scrimmage. The boys looked a little ragged, and there's little doubt Terry is in search of more material. A 10-game schedule calls for more than II good men—it means a team ought to have em three deep in nearly every spot.

But Terry will have some able assist-

ance next fall from Roy Engle, former Hoover High and U. S. C. star athlete, who was appointed assistant coach. Engle helped Terry this spring on a temporary basis. He played for Howard Jones 1939-40 Trojan Rose Bowl elevens.

#### PRE-MED SCHOLARSHIPS

Dr. R. D. Harwood, head of the State College life science department, announced recently that \$600 in scholarship loans has been made available for premedical students by the Women's Auxiliary of the San Diego Medical Society. After three years of study at the college, pre-medical students will be eligible for loans in amounts to be determined by the college.
