First, the Association is now in the progress of becoming a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of California. Articles of incorporation have been signed by the officers of the Association and have been forwarded to the State Secretary's office for approval.

Second, under the articles of incorporation, the Treasurer's office has been combined with that of the Executive Secretary.

These changes, approved by the Board of Directors in meeting June 4 and the general membership in meeting June 17, were adopted at the suggestion of the Finance committee.

## 'Crossing The Last Dim Line Into Eternity'

(The following, written by Spencer Held '23, was published in a recent edition of The Tribune-Sun in that paper's "Good Afternoon" column, It expresses a sentiment common to countless Alumni who "remember when . . . " - Editor's Note).

### By SPENCER HELD

On a recent Sunday afternoon I visited the State College campus. The white buildings and well-kept grounds were deserted; my footsteps rang hollowly along the cement walks and I felt the presence of a company of ghostsghosts of the 120 State College boys who were killed in the war.

Inevitably I felt myself drawn toward Aztec bowl. The gates were locked, but I followed a path that brought me down to the north end of the field. The bowl yawned empty and silent except for the song of a meadowlark and quail calling to each other across the field. A covey of quail was lined up on the five-yard line. As I walked across the turf they whirred into the air and disappeared in a brush-covered canyon.

My thoughts went back a few years. remembered hard-fought football games I had seen there; games before the war when the Aztec rooting section sang "Roll Out the Barrel," to the gestures of two cavorting girls and the music of a red-hot swing band.

I thought of that famous State 9, Santa Barbara 8, game in 1936. Santa Barbara had one of the best small-college teams in the country that year, undefeated until the Aztec encounter.

. One of the stars for State was Allen (Swede) Lovine, an Indian quarterback.

Nobody in the crowd that applauded his play could foresee that he would be killed in action a few years later.

I thought of Bill Goodchild and Tom Cozens, other Aztec aces who died in the war . . . Russell Newbury, Jack Frost, Paul Siraton—the list is a long and honorable one.

A navy plane zoomed overhead and remembered big, good-natured Art **Kelly,** who became a navy flier and was killed in the South Pacific.

It seemed, as the sun dipped below the bowl and shadows lengthened across the field, that a full team of ghosts was lined up there in front of me. Swede Lovine was calling signals. They ran through their plays smoothly, effortlessly, moving in phantom formation down the field and crossing the last dim line into eternity.

# News of Aztecs In the Service . . . . . Or Mustered Out . . . .

### · From the Overseas Mailbag

The overseas mailing list is down to around 200 now, but we still receive a few letters from FPO and APO addresses. We need more—how about it fellows?

Ist Lt. Edwin G. Swann wrote from Clark Field, Luzon, to bring us up to date on his whereabouts. When the February News Letter reached him a month after the March issue, it reminded him to send in his address.

minded him to send in his address.

Ed wrote: "My mail is pretty well snafu. In the past few months I have received so many orders, changes of station, cancellations and tentative dispositions that I now feel like an Indian club in a juggling act. To mention just a few—I was in a replacement depot in Calcutta at the begining of Feb. and was even clearing the base for the 'USS Gen. Hase' when the shipment was canceled, or rather postponed, while they removed a few of us unfortunates from the list.

"While I was at the depot, by the way, I saw John Rockey, who made a later boat and is now probably out of the service. (No word yet—Ed.) After that I was put on orders for Shanghai, China, but was taken off at the last minute. Then I was transferred back to AACS (now ACS) to be sent by them to Wiesbade, Germany, but that too fell thru, so finally in desperation they shuffled me to Manila, where I landed on the sixth of April. From there I was assigned to Clark Field."

Pfc. Robert L. Crane received a batch of News Letters at the same time at Chinhae, Korea, and reported that they gave his morale a big lift.

"I had not received any mail for several days," wrote Bob, "and thought that I had been entirely forgotten, when those welcome booklets of news from home arrived and changed completely my outlook on life. Although we of the occupation armies see no combat over here, we are fighting a different type of battle overseas—a battle against boredom. Our ammunition is mail from home and the fight is a never ending one....

"Our pin-up pictures become ancient rather rapidly over here, and I was very thankful for the pictures of candidates for the Blue Book Ball which graced the front cover of the February issue. . . . Also I enjoyed the article on "Plans for a Greater San Diego State College." by **Dr. Hepner** and his optimistic views on State's being a great sports center in the near future."

Pfc. Edgar A. Millsberg wrote late in April but his letter was mislpaced, and

## Sports Roundup.

Coach Charlie Smith has made a habit of producing great baseball teams at San Diego State, but few, if any, of his Aztec clubs ever compiled a greater record than the 1946 team. The Aztecs compiled an overall season record of 32 victories against 7 defeats, and they won the California Collegiate Athletic Association title for the second straight time with 11 victories in 12 games, including one forfeiture.

San Diego had five consistent winning pitchers in Phil Seewald, Hal (Lefty) Clarke, Jim Gleason, Fulton Vickery and John Bradshaw—all of whom are due to return next season, and came up with the C.C.A.A. individual batting champion in Centerfielder Mickey Aguirre with a .415 average. For the entire season, Outfielder-Catcher John Ritchey nosed out Aguirre by three percentage points, .356 to .353.

Despite their complete dominance of the conference, the Aztecs placed only three men on the All-C.C.A.A. team—Aguirre, Ritchey (for the second year) and Seewald. Five others made the second team—Clarke as a pitcher, George Caswell at second base, Fred Rapp at shortstop, Ruben Beseda in the outfield and Don Brorson, third baseman, as a utility man.

#### Steele Boosts Record

When the May News Letter went to press, Aztec **Willie Steele** had just boosted his State College broad jump record to 25 feet 5/8 inches in the Fresno Relays. Shortly afterwards he broke it for the third time with a winning leap of 25 feet 1 7/8 inches in the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays. To date this is the best inter-collegiate mark in the country this year.

Steele was denied a chance to compete in the recent national collegiate championships in Minneapolis because San Diego State's membership in the NCAA had lapsed during the war. However, he added to his laurels by winning the broad jump title in the National A. A. U. championships June 29 at San Antonio. He is State's first National A. A. U. champion.
