8-DAY GOLDEN JUBILEE OPENS MAY 4th

The greatest celebration in San Diego State College's history, commemorating the 50th anniversary of the founding of the college by legislative enactment in 1897, will be held May 4 to 11, bringing thousands of Alumni back to their Alma Mater.

Under the general chairmanship of **Dr. Lauren C. Post**, first and only Honorary Life Member of the Alumni Association to date, the eight-day 50th Anniversary Celebration, months in preparation and involving the cooperation of hundreds of faculty, students and Alumni, is ready at last to be unfolded, day by day.

Every event on the crowded week-long program should hold interest for Alumni, but two features—the Reunion Evening on Monday, May 5, and the Reunion Dance on Friday, May 9, at

Pacific Square—have been created especially for Alumni. They seem destined to bring out the greatest gatherings of Aztec Alumni in history.

The citizens of San Diego city and county, too, are expected to visit the campus in record numbers.

For the benefit of Alumni, events of the 50th Anniversary Celebration are described below in day-by-day sequence. All Alumni are urged to reserve these dates on their calendars and attend or take part in as many events as possible.

Sunday, May 4— Glee Club Festival

Music reigns on the opening day of the 50th Anniversary Celebration, with San Diego State College acting as host to the first post-war Pacific Southwest

Intercollegiate Glee Club Festival at 2:30 p.m. at Russ Auditorium. With the exception of the Reunion Dance, this is the only event of the week for which admission will be charged.

In addition to San Diego State's Treble Clef, directed by **L. Deborah Smith**, and Men's Glee, directed by **Christine Springston**, glee clubs from Occidental, U.C.L.A., Pomona, Redlands, U.S.C. and Pepperdine are scheduled to participate.

Each club will sing for six minutes, and then all will join to sing "Thanksgiving for Victory," by **Vaughan Wil-**

Aztecs to Clash With Trojan Nine

San Diego State's baseball season will reach its high point—particularly as far as Alumni are concerned—when **Coach Charlie Smith's** Aztecs meet the University of Southern California Trojans in an Alumni-sponsored game Tuesday night, May 13, at 8:15 at Lane Field.

It should easily be the top collegiate game of the season here, for **Coach Sam Barry's** Trojans appear to be the best in the Pacific Coast Conference, while the Aztecs, as this issue went to press, had run up an impressive record of 14 victories in 16 games and were well on their way toward a third straight Cali-

fornia Collegiate Athletic Association championship.

The Aztecs already have humbled one P.C.C. team—University of California—by a 13 to 2 score this season, and they

MEMORIAL PLAQUE WILL HONOR STATE'S WAR DEAD

San Diego State College's 135 students and Alumni who gave their lives in World War II will be honored in appropriate ceremonies May 29 when a bronze memorial plaque bearing their names will be dedicated on campus.

The program, to be held during the noon hour on the day preceding Memorial Day—which will be a campus holiday—will include the appearance of the Marine Base band, a prominent speaker representing the military services, a service chaplain and civic officials.

Sponsorship of the plaque and the May 29 program is a project of the Veterans' Organization, of which **Bill Smith** is president, but the \$600 plaque will be paid for by public subscription on the campus.

The Board of Directors of the Alumni Association voted to contribute \$10 to the fund at its meeting March 26. Alumni may contribute as individuals if they desire. Checks should be made payable to the Associated Students and marked for the Memorial Plaque Fund.

History Published

News of especial interest to Alumni is that a history of San Diego State College will be off the presses and ready for distribution in connection with the 50th Anniversary Celebration.

The history, entitled "**San Diego State College—The First Fifty Years**," will be approximately 100 pages in length and is the semester project of **Dr. Lewis B. Lesley's** graduate seminar class in history.

Months of research, including countless interviews and a thorough search of the library archives, including the complete files of "The Lantern," "The Aztec" and "Del Sudoeste," went into its preparation. **Dr. Lesley** and members of his class wrote the entire history except for the chapter covering the college's role in World War II, which was written by **Dr. Lauren C. Post**.

Beginning point of the history is the action taken by the California state legislature in March, 1897, authorizing establishment of a State Normal School in San Diego. It recounts the opening of the first classes in an upper story of the Hill building at Sixth Ave. and F Street in the fall of 1897, the dedication of the first building on the campus at Park Blvd. and El Cajon Ave. (now Horace Mann Junior High School) on May 1, 1898, and the move to the present campus in January, 1931.

Also covered in considerable detail are the administrations of the three presidents who have served the college, **Dr. Samuel T. Black** (1897-1910), **Dr. Edward L. Hardy** (1910-1935) and **Dr. Walter R. Hepner** (1935-).

PHI KAPS ORGANIZE CHAPTER

In line with a more active Alumnae organization of former Staters, Phi Kappa Gamma sorority began the year of 1947 by organizing an Alpha chapter, which includes all of the earlier members of the sorority.

The Alpha group will work with the regular Alumnae chapter of the sorority and as their first activity they turned out "en masse" for the Phi Kappa Gamma Founders' Day banquet in February.

Mrs. Terrence B. Geddis (Grace Gans) president of the Alpha Chapter, announces that the group will meet monthly. In place of the regular April meeting, all members attended the Treble Clef concert in Russ Auditorium.

Kaiser, Steele Set Pace in Aztec Track

In track and field, **Jack Kaiser**, freshman all-around star, and **Willie Steele**, last year's National A.A.U. broad jump champion, took the spotlight as **Coach Charles (Choc) Sportsman's** Aztecs broke even in their first two meets. Despite 32 points contributed by Kaiser and Steele, San Diego was nosed out by University of Arizona, 67 2/3 to 63 1/3, in the season's first meet, but the Aztecs came back to defeat Pepperdine, 84 to 47, with the same pair scoring 30 points.

Against Arizona, Steele set a meet record in the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet 3/4 inches and won both sprints handily. Against Pepperdine he hit :09.8 in the 100-yard dash for the first time this season and in the longer race, run at 240 yards by mistake, was clocked in the equally good time of :24.1.

Kaiser equalled a meet record against Arizona when he won the high hurdles in :14.7, but two weeks later he came

back to run :14.5 against Pepperdine. He also has marks of 13 feet in the pole vault, 6 feet 2 inches in the high jump and 22 feet 3 3/4 inches in the broad jump to his credit.

Steele won the broad jump at the Drake Relays, April 25th, with a leap of 24 feet 6 1/2 inches.

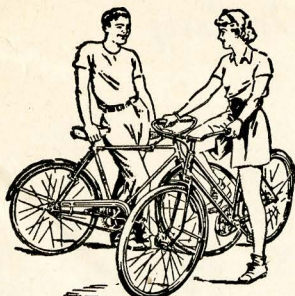

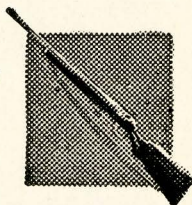

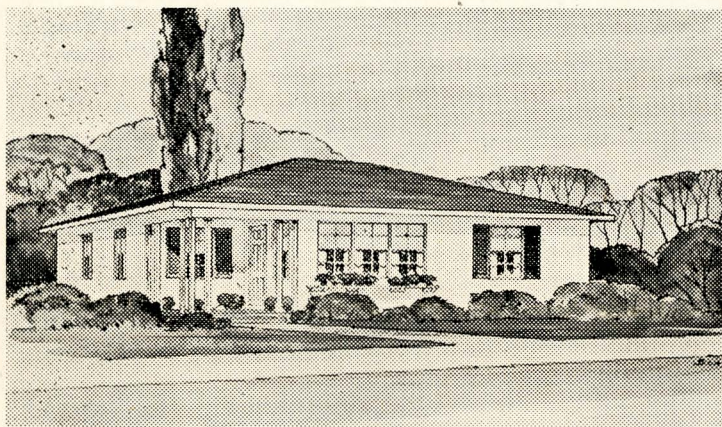
