The NEWS LETTER as an experiment has proved to be successful, and the letters are pouring in. For the information of those who did not get the Letter, I might say here that the purpose of the Letter is to help in every possible way in keeping the service men and their friends in touch with each other and with the college. We want your names, addresses, and news of promotions and activities. (But we don't want any infractions of the censor rules, so tell us only that which you don't mind having published.)

To all Aztecs and Faculty members:

Have you done your share of writing to the service men? Try picking out a few addresses and writing to them. And when you get letters from the service men, let us have addresses and at least a few paragraphs that would have general interest.

Our filing system contains all of the names and addresses that have come in and the mailing list includes every one for whom we have an address so you may do a fellow a good turn by merely giving us his address.

The Aztec has kindly consented to print the News Letter through the remainder of the semester, but after the close of the semester the only means of support that we have, in present view, is a fund being solicited from the faculty. Their contributions have been coming in fast and should last for a short while. In time we may have to solicit for carrying on through the summer. A complete revised list of addresses is to appear soon.

I was so happy to receive your "News Letter" and was astounded to learn of the number of my brothers of Sigma Delta "psi" who are also in the air force. I know of no former Aztecs here at Tulare; however, I ran into many while at Santa Ana. Max Brown, a Carlsbad boy (Omega Xi), who graduated from State is in Co. 13 at Santa Ana; a navigation student. Tommy Marvin (Alpha Phi Omega) is in the Air force band stationed at the West Coast Replacement Center at Santa Ana.
