Excerpts from the talk made by 1st Lt. Griffith P. Williams on July 8, 1942 in the Little Theater

"We have all been given orders not to talk about anything that took place before or after the raid--- only what took place during the actual raid. What took place before and after is a 'military secret'.

"The whole flight was made at low elevation in order to escape detection. They had no idea we were coming. Our particular target was Kobe - not Tokyo. We arrived at Kobe at about 1:30^p their time and about an hour and a half after Tokyo had been bombed, but it seemed that the population was carrying on as usual. We dropped all our bombs before they did any firing at all.

"On our way to Kobe we had to cross about 50 miles of land. This was planted mostly in rice and the workers and a lot of people waved at us. After they discovered we were enemy planes the boys threw rocks at us and shook their fists at us-- that was the only opposition we had.

"Every ship was assigned a definite target. The kind of ammunition we had depended on the kind of target we were after. We carried incendiary bombs in our ship. We had reports that the fires we started were burning three days later. We bombed two aircraft factories and some warehouses. Probably six or eight aircraft factories were bombed in all. We were given instructions not to bomb the emperor's palace.

"Some warships fired on some of the planes after they left the land and were over the water. Some fighter planes took after us but we just pulled away from them without opening the throttle all the way.

"The planes were all manned on a volunteer basis. More men volunteered than could go. Sixteen planes started and sixteen planes came back.

"A lot of pictures were taken - both stills and movies. I have never seen them. They are in the hands of the Intelligence Office."

They have us on a little island in the South Pacific. We had a swell trip over and naturally crossed the equator. We are all a bunch of hard shelled Shellbacks now.

This isn't such a bad place but they sure did have us snowed under when we first arrived. The English money system and all this driving on the wrong side of the road got us. In the trucks I forget that the wrong side of the road is the right side. And I know darned well the natives skinned us before we got onto their

their money and learned to argue them down. Now we get good prices.

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They are a friendly bunch of people and like the Americans very much. They are somewhat primitive and live in swell grass huts. The outside isn't so much to look at but inside they are comfortable and clean. I made friends with one of the local chiefs and had dinner at his shack one night. During the course of the evening he gave me three of his villages and made me chief of another. He has his wife and daughters do all my laundry free, but I'm beginning to feel that I'd be better off doing my own. The women all go down to the river and beat the devil out of the clothes. (Then the little boys pick up the buttons.)

I have received two copies of the Aztec News Letter. Thanks. All the San Diego fellows got together and had all kinds of fun sweating it out and finding where old friends ended up.

I certainly wish that I could write you an uncensored letter. We could have a swell time exchanging photographs of our different locations. As it is now we can't even send personal photos home.

By the way, did you know my brother Ernie was graduated from flight school in Canada and qualified as pilot officer? After graduation he got a transfer to the American Air Corps and has three weeks training at an advanced school to prove himself--- then wings from our Army. Thanks again, and Aloha. Wally McAnulty

P.S. I especially enjoyed the remembrance of the "38" Frosh Squad. Really tough about Newsom, wasn't it? Sure glad to see so many of them getting commissions. Hope one of these days we all will.

This is just a short note from one of State's former students to inform you of the pleasure received by the many former students who are down here upon receipt of your publication and Aztec. In our headquarters on the staff working together as a team are a number of ex-Staters: Captains James B. Willey, Boyd E. Thompson, Gordon Dawson, C.V.Fry, and yours truly. Many nights when we are whiling away the hours, we kid about our college days together.

I am fortunate that my brother, Capt. J.C.Long, is with me. His record is one that I am proud of, and he was commended personally for his outstanding ability and work accomplished in Oahu.

Censorship permits me very little latitude in what I may say so it is impossible for me to mention the number of officers and men who are here from State, but I am sure that State and the City of San Diego can be proud of the record "San Diego's Own" has made to date. Our motto or saying is - "When we march up Broadway in Tokyo!" Thanks again for the news to the boys and I trust more will be coming in the future.
