The way it was there wasn't a darn thing to do when one did get a day off. The guys usually would go down town to a show and then wander around until it was time to catch a truck home. You can imagine how it would be with a few of the boys wanting a cold drink.....

I can see just how you feel about some of the fellows going at the hand of this devilish enemy we are fighting. It really is a shame when swell fellows like Johnny Butler and Bob Newson go. But I know one thing. When they go, there will be just that many more fellows like myself that knew them and who will fight with a vengeance that they had never bothered to think of.

The fellows are always gathering at night for great "bull sessions" and it seems funny to hear men talk of killing and mornning it. Sometimes I wonder how it will affect them in later life. You know, something like that will linger in a guy's mind and it really leaves some sort of impression. Probably the greatest cause for it is the sweating (waiting) for something to pop. I know that I would enjoy another encounter with our little friends.....

The thing we all enjoyed was the listing of the 38 Frosh team. (In a personal letter to Mac, I had written a line or two about every member of the 38 Frosh Football roster giving their whereabouts and latest activity. L.C.F.) It's really something when you stop to think, just how many of them have commissions in the service. There are only a few of us left in the non-commissioned ranks. Really, I believe that all of us will come out of this with a bar of some sort and I hope it's not the prison variety.

He, for one, should make a fine officer. Too bad Sam's eyes are bad; it would be a tough break if he can't make officer training. I can just see Russ (LT. RUSSELL NEWBERRY). It would be a treat just to see him crab....If he gets sent overseas I'd like to see him assigned here so we could get together once in a while. I wouldn't mind being in an Infantry outfit myself. Then maybe I could get in a commando outfit.

I really would like for you to thank Coach John and Mrs. Perry for asking about me. I always did enjoy her class.

Doc, you certainly deserve credit and we realize the time and effort it must take to get up a thing like the News Letter. I can assure you that I get a lot of enjoyment out of it. I had my curiosity satisfied about some of the fellows and I have written to several of them since.

Dear Doc: I received your News Letter No. 5 and was happy to be brought so close again to the memories of State College. Before I go off on another tangent, please let me inform you that this is my last week here and to send my next News Letter

c/o 3680 Indiana St., San Diego, Calif. This is my parents address. They, in turn will forward any correspondence until I have my next residence established.

Well so much for that. Perhaps you're wondering just what I'm doing, tucked away up in the Finger Lakes region of Western New York? Actually, I'm attending an indoctrination school at Cornell U. During a period of 8 weeks the Navy tries to make gentlemen, officers and tarzans out of us. The day here is long (5:45 a.m. 'till 10 p.m. with no leave except 30 hours from Sat' noon until Sunday nite at 7:30 p.m.) but you never have to worry about what to do! One little item that has strongly impressed me is the fact that we do as much marching as any soldier I ever knew. For example: One of the boys in our company has a pedometer which registers the mileage he walks. Through the first month he (and I include all of us) averaged 10 miles per day or 240 for August.

I have had many interesting experiences and feel in top condition. Before leaving San Diego I weighed 175. Friday, weighing in after a workout, I tipped the scales at 162.

In closing, let me thank you again for placing me on your mailing list. Also please give my regards to Dr. Hepner and his wife. Until we meet again,

Dear Dr. Post: I just received News Letter No. 5. Thanks so much for sending it to me. I am afraid the postman had to work overtime to find me. I moved four times since I was at Camp Robinson. Right now I am in a very nice section of Ohio. It's pretty cold and it rains most of the time but it's the best I have had since I was in California.....

As you can tell by the address I am no longer in the medical department but attached to a new division of the air corps. The men of the air corps seem like a grand bunch of regular, ambitious men..... Our work here is tough---mainly in a physical manner. We have been studying the tactics used in commando work and training so that we can carry out that line of duty. So far our course has followed the ideas of the parachute troops. It's really very fine training and so far I have enjoyed every bit of it.

There are a lot of men from California here but none from San Diego.

Wallace McNulty's letter was also very popular mainly because it told a little of the country we all hope to get to soon. I was quite interested in Major Long's letter.
