

P.O. 3026 - 154 - OBS - Sqn. N.Y. He is probably on his way...Sorry to make it so short but I am on the grindstone... (George, do you remember the Marine game in '38 when you and Frank Diamond got knocked out? Dr. Harbaugh had me tickle your toes to help bring you to. I worked hard for 30 minutes before I could even get you to talk. Can you imagine that? L.C.P.)

There is a large gym and also a theater on the camp. They are something new to me.

From: Benson L. Slavin, C. Sp., 58th Batt. 31st Reg., U.S.N.T.S., Great Lakes, Ill. address changed to above Thanks, etc. Am still at the Great Lakes in the same capacity as a company commander. My work is interesting and as yet the novelty of a new experience hasn't worn off.

From: Lt. Chester DeVore, 12th R.O.C., Co. E, M.C.S., Quantico, V.——— Thanks, etc. My class finishes December 5th and I am praying that I'll be sent to San Diego even if it is just to get on a boat to shove off. I was commissioned on the 26th of September. You may inform the boys who are planning on going through O.C.S. that it is no cinch course. Mostly physical work of one kind or another—running obstacle courses, bayonet practice, thrashing around through the boon docks (back country), practicing extended order exercises, etc. We have Map Reading (contours, coordinates, terrain, physical features, etc.) I like it because it is put to you in a very practical manner.

..... Jack Doyle is here as you know. He was in the same barracks until I was commissioned.... Doc. Post, if there are any fellows who are undecided as to what branch of the service they want, send them to the Marines. The fellows are ready

to fight and the sooner the better.

From St. Owen Asberry, ASN 39162441, Sig. Team C., & Post Master, New York, N.Y. 4 (Passed by Consor - This letter came by V-Mail and is our first letter to come via that method)

Dear Dr. Fost: Your very welcome News Letter reached me in India! I am sorry to say that it is No. 4 and my first, but I suppose that is my fault for not writing to more students telling them my address. After seven months overseas without seeing anyone from home (it is a year since I left San Diego) it is a great help to hear about old friends and to learn their addresses. I was glad of the opportunity to read Torres' letter and I found several other addresses that I shall make use of soon. -- We went to Australia first where we were given a warm welcome by those most hospitable people. We found Australia to be quite homelike, but India is a bit different. The people here, their customs, food, dress, etc. are all so strange. At first the strangeness was interesting and curious, but we are getting accustomed to them now. The "Star of India" is not quite as romantic as I pictured it in the past, but we did not come here hunting romance. My job, to me, is the most interesting of any in the army, and I would not trade for any other branch of the service. Our quarters are exceptionally good, and the food is plantiful and nourishing. I often think of my two years at State, recently more often than usual, but (with spologies to the academic portion of the school) I must admit that my thoughts seem to wender down to the Training School cafe! This wer isn't being fought on corned willie and borns, but oh! what Mrs. Dawes couldn't do to our morale! Thanks again for the Fews Letter and please keen me on your list in the future. Another Aztec in my outfit is Lt. Chas. B. Read with whom I used to pal around during my first two years at State. Certainly seems funny to be saluting him now. I'll see that Glory gives you my A.P.O. number.. Say hello to the gamg.. P.S. How about slipping the word to Dorothy Ferguson that I am entitled to be put on the Aztec mailing list?
