

Alumni Nominating Committee Appointed In Preparation for Elections This Fall

Appointment of a nominating committee to begin preparations for the annual election of officers of the Alumni Association in October was one of the main items of business accomplished at the Board of Directors' meeting held July 23 at the home of Mrs. William E. Self, president.

Selected by the president for the five-man committee were Jean Pittman, who will act as chairman; Robert Halley, Charles T. Byrne, Barney Carman and Barbara Wright Ottwell.

The committee will canvass the eligible membership (paid up members) and prepare a list of nominees for the offices of president, first and second vice-presidents and secretary, and 10 members of the Board of Directors. (One-half of the present Board remains in office for another year.)

Crossroads Report From Kwajelein

From Kwajalein atoll, where the now famous B-29 "Dave's Dream" took off with the first atomic bomb dropped at Bikini, The Aztec Alumni News has received an interesting letter from Pfc. Edgar A. Millsberg, describing activities on A-Day. The printed letterhead was a reproduction of the mushroom cloud effect caused by the atom bomb.

In the belief that it is a matter of general interest, The Aztec Alumni News herewith prints Millsberg's eyewitness account from Kwajalein in full:

"At 0100, we were awakened by the CQ, and told to get up, eat and be at the baseball diamond across the street from group headquarters at the southeast end of the atoll with our panchos and canteens at 0300. We also could take our bathing suits, if we wanted. As we assembled at the baseball diamond, we were loaded into trucks and taken to the north end of the atoll. The reason for this was that if by some means the bomb exploded before the takeoff of the bomber, we would be out of the zone of radio activity.

"All of the men, except for skeleton crews, were at the evacuation area by 0415. Most of us went to sleep on the beach until it was light enough to go in swimming or play ball or cards, etc. Some went to the Red Cross canteen and had coffee and donuts, while still others played records over the radio.

"The men on the beach, although having it start to rain twice during the night and also having to listen to hill-billy music coming over the loudspeaker, had no trouble getting to sleep. Around 0600, we were awakened by the sound of the bombers taking off enroute to their target—Bikini.

"As the clock neared 0830, we heard over the broadcasting system that the bombers were nearing their target. We all stopped what we were doing and listened. The bomb was dropped at 0900 Island time, July I, or 1400 Pacific Standard time, June 30. As we stood listening to the results being broadcast over the loudspeaker, we looked to the north and saw a white cloud rising from the horizon. We knew right away that it was the mushroom cloud caused by the atom bomb 260 miles away. The cloud was said to have reached an altitude of 50,000 feet.

"About half an hour after the bomb was dropped, we were returned to the baseball diamond by trucks and went to work. At 1200 we were given the rest of the day off to catch up on our

sleep. That is all that happened on Able Day, and now in nine more days (from July 16) we will have the second test, better known as "Baker Day." Immediately after "B-Day" the majority of the Crossroads personnel will board the ship "George Clymer," and get ready to sail for the good old U. S. A. I have only been overseas five months, but it seems a lot longer."

A column can't do justice to Wade and Miller—it would take an entire volume to include the charm of the 26-year-old boys themselves and their doings since those first inseparable days at Wilson Junior High when they produced their first collaborative effort, a burlesque cops-and-robbers drama.

Days at Hoover high were spent edit-

ing all the usual things.

They entered State in the fall of '38, joined Sigma Lambda, immediately gravitated to campus publications, eventually edited El Palenque, the handbook, and the Aztec, ended up in Blue Key and National Collegiate Who's Who

Those who were lucky were invited to view their dramatic efforts, all written in collaboration, usually starring the boys, and paid for by week-ends working at chain stores. They won the One-Act Play Tourney with "Number 77," and invited more friends to see their "Honor Among Thieves," starring themselves, Barbara Wright, and Shirley and Patsy Hubbard. "Going Crooked" had the "Thieves" cast, plus Carroll Wright, Gordon Cleator and Leon Carver.

Filming of "Beau Geste," using Paramount's Fort Zinderneuf used in Gary Cooper's vehicle, began in '39, and campus patrons enjoyed the finished product in the spring of '40. Following Paramount's demand that they show the film only three times, then hide it, the boys came out with a \$200 loss for their efforts.

Another win in the One-Act Play Tourney — this time starred Gloria Winke, Barbara Wright and Sheldon

Campbell.

Spare moments in summer of '40 were spent writing half-hour radio plays for the Don Lee Workshop, followed by a 13-week series called the Don Lee School of the Air for the network, dealing with South America.

Another cup, their third, for the One-Act Play Tourney. This time Gloria Winke, Sheldon Campbell and Jim Lowell starred.

By the end of summer '41, filming had been completed on "King Congo," a feature-length burlesque of all jungle movies, cast in Mission Valley. The boys' effort was shown three nights, with a rented spotlight sweeping the sky at the premiere, just before Pearl Harbor, when the blackout halted all

shows. "Congo" cost \$1,000, was a \$10 loss—the cost of the spotlight.

After three and a half years of electives, mostly journalism and drama, Wade and Miller left campus to edit the East San Diego Press, then the largest circulating weekly in town.

Spring of '42 both entered army air force, but soon were separated for rest of war. Bob became public relations non-com, spent two and a half years seeing England, North African invasion, Sardinia, Italy, Southern France invasion, and Corsica. Bill spent the entire war sergeant majoring at the Santa Ana Air Base, 90 miles from home.

Bob came back in February '45 to marry Gloria Winke. Bill was best man.

V-J Day Bill left Santa Ana for Manila, where he became personnel sergeant major of the Fifth Air Service Aera Command.

A three-act play outline, left over from '40, had been discussed by V-Mail while Bob was in Africa. Now Bill wrote the first draft of a novel based on their 1940 idea, sent it home to Bob, and followed immediately himself in February '46, for discharge. He found that Bob had rewritten the novel, now named "Deadly Weapon," had secured an agent, who had sold it to a publisher. The same week their radio show, "Gloria Winke's San Diego Scrapbook," was bought by Marston's.

News of Aztecs In the Service Or Mustered Out

Report From Overseas

Cpl. Francis M. Worcester '37, who is with the only Marine detachment left in Japan, wrote from Yokosuka, Honshu, on some handkerchief-sized material that appeared to be rice paper. He has an interesting job as radio chief of the communications section of the Marine detachment, which somewhat compensates for the fact that he and 23 others were pulled back after once being assigned to the 2nd Marine Division to be sent home. They were at an embarkation point for two weeks—then suddenly were recalled.

Worcester will have 24 months to his overseas credit on Dec. 27, and expects to be sent home at that time. He asked to be remembered to Bill Koller, Alumni membership chairman, with the message that his Alumni dues would

be following soon.

Lt. Edwin G. Swann, who reported in from Clark Field, Luzon, with a lengthy letter last month, wrote again and enclosed his Alumni dues. He wrote July 3 and was looking forward with anticipation to the celebration the following day which was to accompany achievement of independence by the Philippine Islands. Ed is still doing control tower work at Clark Field.

The Aztec Alumni chapter on Luzon is gradually being reduced. Lt. Bill Self came home in June, and soon afterwards Lt. John (Corny) Swift wrote from Manila requesting that the Alumni News be sent to his home in Chula Vista, since he was leaviing for the States in a few days. So far he hasn't reported from this end. He is undoubtedly one of the last of the famous "Original 38" ERC's to get home.

When last heard from on Manus Island, in the Admiralty group, S. T. Browne, Jr., Y3/c, was anxiously awaiting a transport which he hoped would get him home early in July for discharge. (If it did, he hasn't reported in yet.) At the time he wrote, Ted said there were more than 1000 men at Seeadler harbor awaiting transportation to the States, and that there hadn't been a transport in for a month.

He was unable to locate any other Aztecs on Manus, but did find three other San Diegans, Robert Earl Lewis,




