Alumni in the San Diego area planning to go to the game also are invited to attend the gathering. The early hour will allow plenty of time for a dinner gathering before attending the game at Whittier, only about six miles away.

White Ballot Marks Alumni Election

Officers who will guide the Alumni Association of San Diego State College through the calendar year of 1947 will be elected this month, along with 10 members of the Board of Directors who will serve for a two-year term. To the disappointment of the Nominating Committee, a complete white ballot is being offered for the first election conducted under the provisions of the Alumni Association constitution

adopted this year.

The Nominating Committee met in August and nominated one slate of officers and board members which was published in the September AZTEC ALUMNI NEWS, with the expectation that additional nominations would come from the membership by petition, as provided by the constitution.

However, no nominations were forthcoming by petition, so a white ballot will go in the mail to all paid members next week. Members have the privilege of voting for write-in candidates if

they wish.

Robert Breitbard '41, incumbent first vice-president, tops the Nominating Committee's slate as nominee for president. He has been active in all Alumni affairs and was greatly instrumental in the success of three Alumni events this year: the April dinner which

Alumni to Reopen Old Collegiate Club

The Old Collegiate Club, popular meeting place of local high school and college students for weekly Friday night dances from 1936 until the war intervened in 1941, is to be reopened at the Mission Beach ballroom under sponsorship of the Alumni Association of San Diego State College.

First of the new Collegiate Club dance series will be held Friday night, Oct. 18, at Mission Beach, and they will continue weekly thereafter on Friday nights until the first of June, 1947.

Donald S. Lindstrum, Ex-'42, has been signed by the Alumni Association as manager of the club and, operating under policies set down by the Board of Directors, he will handle all business matters and will supervise personnel necessary to the operation of the club. Lindstrum formerly was associated with the club.

Through Lindstrum, the Alumni Association at first negotiated for return of the Collegiate Club to its former location in Balboa Park, but several factors, including uncertainty of the Navy's removal and unsatisfactory condition of buildings, made it necessary to go to Mission Beach. The club may return to Balboa Park later.

Lindstrum reports great interest on the part of high school students in the revival of the Collegiate Club, and he predicts a membership of from 1500 to 2000 soon will be reached.

Men students of all high schools in the area, as well as the college, may purchase yearly memberships for \$1.00. Admission to each dance will be \$1.00 per couple. Free parking will be provided on the south parking lot at Mission Beach, on the ocean side of the highway, with admittance only by membership card.

Because the Collegiate Club now will be sponsored by a non-profit organization, many high school students who join could indirectly be contributing to their own education. All proceeds, after

rental, operating expenses and salaries of cashiers, ticket takers, guards, etc., have been paid, will go into an Alumni fund for the establishment of scholarships.

Reopening of the club on this basis has received the enthusiastic approval of educational and civic leaders, including Dr. John Carroll, county superintendent of schools; President Walter R. Hepner, of the college; Mayor Harley E. Knox; Leo Calland, city recreational director; high school principals and the Parent-Teachers' Association.

Membership cards are now on sale at all high schools and at the book store on campus. Hours will be 8 to 12.

IST LT. RAUL CALLO

First Lt. Raul Callo was killed last month in a plane crash in Korea while returning from a photographic mission. Lt. Callo attended San Diego State College in 1942 and later joined the Air Corps. While in the service he was in one of the first Photographic Reconnaissance groups to go to Japan.

where she stayed five and a half months. In order to keep up the library for the 17,000 men at this one camp, Riva said that they actually had to steal their electric lights and stoves to make the place usable, used shoe repair shop coupons for library cards.

G.I. libraries are conducted on an informal basis, with no "quiet" signs, no overdue notices, a simplified decimal system, and smoking and drinking cokes permitted. While at Camp Baltimore, Riva saw Lt. Ohan Kerian, then at headquarters at Reims where he was billeting officer for Special Service Shows. She also saw Adelia Mustain, former State college librarian, who was at Camp Carlisle for four months before returning to the States because of poor health.

Assignment to Deggendorf, 45 miles from the Czech border, came in Dec. '45, so Riva joined the 37th tank battalion, commanded by Col. waite (who is handling the junior varsity) though left shorthanded by the resignation of Roy Engle, is doing a fine job.


Several familiar faces to Aztec football fans of yore are seen on campus daily, including Louie Poluzzi, still eligible but unable to don the pads because of a back injury.
