

1946 Alumni Homecoming Called Best Yet

Homecoming for 1946 is history pleasant history.

The two-day celebration and reunion, held Nov. I and 2, was one of the most successful yet and left, along with its happy memories, a determination in all those who participated for an even greater Homecoming reunion in 1947.

Open house was observed Friday, Nov. I, at Scripps Cottage from 9 in the morning until 4 in the afternoon, and approximately 100 alums came out to visit the campus and to sign the Alumni Register. They were greeted by Mrs. William E. Self '42, Alumni president, and Mrs. Charles Byrne, Ex-'38, registration chairman. Oldest class represented was '01, by Myrtle E. Johnson.

The student body held its Homecom-

ing rally dance that evening at Mission Beach ballroom, at which time Rose Marie Martin, blonde sophomore, was crowned Homecoming Queen, with Betina Wright and Mary Melton, also sophomores, as attendants.

Alumni from throughout Southern California turned out for the Homecoming football game Saturday afternoon, Nov. 2, as the Aztecs defeated Occidental, 21 to 12, in Balboa stadium. Many were down from the Los Angeles area, and Robert and Mary (Paxton) Kennedy, class of '38, came all the way from San Luis Obispo.

The traditional Homecoming Parade of Floats at the football game, held under direction of Dorothy Morgenroth,

Robert Breithard New President

Robert Breitbard '41, who has been one of the most active participants in Alumni affairs since the reorganization a year ago, heads the new slate of officers which was elected on a white ballot in the October elections.

Breitbard will take over the duties of president on Jan. 1, 1947, succeeding Mrs. William E. Self '42, who had succeeded Barney Carman '36 when the latter resigned last spring.

The executive secretary - treasurer mailed 270 ballots (to paid members only) and 151 were returned, with the white ballot slate of officers and board members selected by the nominating committee receiving a heavy complimentary vote. Thirty-seven persons received write-in votes for various offices, but no individual received more than three votes

As a result of the failure of the membership at large to place nominees on the ballot by petition this year, the nominating committee will recommend that a dual slate be named by the nominating committee for the 1947 elections.

Doubling of the Alumni Association paid membership total, which reached 300 for the first year of the reorganization, is the goal that has been set for 1947 as the Association prepares to swing into a second activity-filled year. Membership renewals do not become due until January, but the Executive Secretary-Treasurer's office reports that 1947 membership cards have already been received from the printers

and that any dues received this month will be credited for all of 1947 as well

as the balance of this year.

Sheldon Campbell, newly - elected president of the class of '47, reports that his cabinet has agreed to sell senior class Alumni memberships along with the regular class dues, and this fact is expected to swell the membership total considerably. The class of '47 totals approximately 180 members.

Action taken by the Board of Directors last spring enables members of the senior class to buy their first year memberships in the Alumni Association for \$1.00.

With the reopening of the membership campaign, **Charles T. Byrne**, executive secretary-treasurer, reminds all Alumni that life memberships are payable at any time.

Life memberships are \$50.00 (and \$20.00 for each additional member of the family) and it is the desire of the officers and board of directors to build up a large life membership and thus create a trust fund for the establishment of scholarships and other worthy

The Alumni by-laws provide that fourfifths of all life dues shall be deposited in a trust fund of which only the





Sports Roundup


Since the October AZTEC ALUMNI NEWS went to press, the Aztec football team has rolled to four victories in five games, made a valiant—if unsuccessful bid for the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship, and has boosted its season record to six victories in nine games.

As the issue goes to press, Coach W. L. (Gander) Terry's men are preparing for their final game with College of Pacific, seeking a victory that would give them undisputed possession of second place in the CCAA standings.

The Aztecs pulled the only major upset of the CCAA schedule on Oct. 26 when they defeated Fresno State, 7 to 0, before 10,000 fans in Balboa stadium. A battle between two outstanding lines finally was decided in San Diego's favor whe **Leo Heaton**, left end, blocked a Bulldog punt and Dale Brassey, right end, fell on the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. Barney Newlee added the extra point.

A week later, in the Homecoming game with Occidental in Balboa stadium, the Aztecs went into a slump and gave a comparitively listless performance, but still had enough power to defeat the Tigers, 21 to 12. At that, the game provided one of the season's most spectacular plays when San Diego scored on a 71yard forward-lateral pass from Art Blaisdell to Jack Kaiser to Tackle Al Sawaya, who ran the last 40 yards. Blaisdell and Kaiser added the other touchdowns, and Newlee booted three more extra points.

At Gilmore stadium in Hollywood on Nov. 8, the Aztecs showed one of their best offensive efforts in defeating Loyola, 20 to 7. John Simcox, moved over to tailback while "Buzz" Brown rode the bench with an injury, and Hub Foote at fullback really "found" themselves in this game. Blaisdell, Simcox and Foote accounted for the touchdowns, and Newlee made two more placements.

The big conference game of the season came Nov. 16 when, with 12,000 fans watching in Balboa stadium, the Aztecs and San Jose State battled for the top spot. Two great lines battled without decision except for a lone thirdquarter drive in which the Spartans went over for the only touchdown to beat San Diego, 6 to 0. Linemen Al Sawaya and Jim Mahlmeister saved two touchdowns with spectacular open field tackles.

San Diego came back to defeat its traditional foe, Santa Barbara, 9 to 7, on Nov. 23 on the Gaucho field, to clinch no less than a tie for second place. The Aztecs picked up two important points on a safety and then got their touchdown on a 40-yard pass play from Blaisdell to Heaton. Foote was one of the heroes when he carried the ball 20 times for 77 yards on power plays through the middle, at one time doing duty on 12 out of 14 plays as the Aztecs marched for four consecutive first downs. Newlee made it 17 extra points out of 20 attempts.

Basketball Next

Coach Charlie Smith sends his Aztec varsity basketball team against an Alumni lineup Tuesday, Dec. 10, in the opener of a 30-game schedule, 21 games of which will be played at home.

Although Dick Barnes, last year's highscoring center, will be missing—he's in the army—the Aztecs will have three pre-war veterans in Kenny Hale, Little All-American in 1940-41, Herb Tompkins and Barney Newlee.

Veterans returning from the 1945-46 team are Sal Gumina, Charlie Hampton, Don Smith, Bernie Goodbody, Dick Mc-Kee and Don Brorson. These will be augmented by a number of promising
