

# "Shadow And Substance," March 20-21-22

Paul Vincent Carroll's Irish drama, "Shadow and Substance," will be presented Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, March 20, 21 and 22, in the State College Little Theatre as the traditional Senior-Alumni play. Curtain time for all performances will be 8:15 p.m.

"Shadow and Substance," a modern drama which combines a religious background with highly developed comedy characterizations, was substituted for "A Doctor in Spite of Himself," which originally was announced as the vehicle for the annual Senior-Alumni revival play. The "Doctor" was dropped when a Shakespearean play was scheduled for the 50th Anniversary, for the drama department did not want to work on two costume productions at the same time.


### HOLLYWOOD-L. A. LETTER



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# ALUMNI FEATURE TREBLE CLEFF PROGRAM

Treble Clef's fourth annual Organ Fund benefit will be given Tuesday, April 15, at 8:15 p.m. in Russ Auditorium under direction of Miss L. Deborah Smith, and in keeping with popular tradition an alumnae chorus of 100 voices will have a featured part in the program.

The Treble Clef Organ Fund, begun in December, 1943, now has reached \$9,200. Over a 10-year period the organization hopes to raise \$25,000 with which to purchase a concert organ for the State College auditorium which, it is expected, will be completed by that time. This will help State College to become the center of musical culture in San Diego.

Ticket prices remain unchanged-\$1.25 (tax included) for the entire ground floor and first half of the balcony and 85 cents for the upper half of the balcony. Exchange tickets may be bought now from any member of Treble Clef, active or alumnae, and exchanged at Thearle's between March 18 and April 8 for choice seats. After that date the ticket sale will be open to the general public.

As usual, alumnae members will come from afar to participate in the concert. Among them are Margaret Russell, from Phoenix, who will be a featured soloist for the Gretchaninoff Credo; Patricia Blethen Van Der Zee and Barbara Lowe, from Los Angeles, and Marscia Helen Genet Menville and Grace Walker Allen, from Imperial Valley.

Soloists for this year's concert will be Daniel Lewis, who accepted but never filled an original invitation in 1942 because of the war. Lewis, concert master of the college orchestra, will be the violin soloist. While stationed in the Hawaiian Islands during the war, he was assistant concert master of the Honolulu symphony orchestra.

An innovation this year will be a group of songs entitled "Campus in Song and Color." While soft voices sing romantic and traditional college songs in the background, beautiful colored slides of campus scenes illustrating the songs will be flashed on a screen on stage. The slides were made especially for the concert by Dr. Kenneth E. Barnhart of the faculty.



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# BASEBALL, TRACK GRAB SPOTLIGHT

Spring means the busiest time of the year for Aztec athletic teams, with two major sports—baseball and track and field—occupying the center of the stage and spring football and a number of minor sports clamoring for attention.

### **State Defends Title**

Alumni will have a particular interest in the success of **Coach Charlie Smith's** baseball team, for one of the highlights of the season will be an Alumni Association-sponsored event—the game between the Aztecs and the U.S.C. Trojans at Lane Field Tuesday, May 13. Arrangements for the game, proceeds of which will be shared equally by the college, the Alumni Association and U.S.C., were made by **Bob Breitbard**, Alumni president, and **Sam Barry**, Trojan coach.

San Diego State is defending champion in the California Collegiate Athletic Association, and prospects that the Aztecs will come up with another championship contender seem good. Among the 50 candidates who turned out early in March were 15 lettermen, three from pre-war teams and 12 from 1946.

Lettermen are Pitchers Hal Clarke, Phil Seewald, Jim Gleason, Fulton Vickery and John Bradshaw—making up a particularly promising mound staff— Catchers Jerry Davison, Sef Murillo and Ernie Beck; Infielders Don Smith, Bobby Kennedy and Don Brorson, and Outfielders Felix (Mickey) Aguirre, Ruben Beseda, Jim Bass and Barney Newlee.

The Aztecs face a difficult 35-game schedule, including 20 conference games. The C.C.A.A. schedule consists of a double round-robin of doubleheaders.

### Track and Field

The most attractive home track and field schedule Aztec fans have enjoyed in years awaits the Aztec thinclads, coached by newcomer Charles (Choc) Sportsman, who produced eight championship teams in 13 years at North Texas State, where he developed the famous distance running twins, Wayne and Blaine Rideout.

On the home schedule are Arizona and Arizona (Tempe) State for March 29, Pepperdine and California Polytechnic for April 12 and U.S.C.'s Trojans and the Los Angeles Athletic Club for May 3, all triangular meets. The

State's team figures to lack balance as well as depth in many events, but several of the coast's most promising individual performers will be under Aztec colors. They include **Willie Steele**, 1946 national A.A.U. broad jump champion whose college-record leap of 25 ft. 17/8 in. was the best in the world last year; **Tom Rice**, C.C.A.A. two-mile champion; **Bill Morales**, who holds the college javelin record of 202 ft. 6 in., and Freshman **Jack Kaiser**, an all-around performer on both the track and field.

### **Basketball Leaves Stage**

One of the most unpredictable of Aztec basketball teams—world beater one night and upset victim the next finished in a three-way tie with San Jose State and Santa Barbara College for second place in the C.C.A.A. race with a 5-5 record. For the entire season, the Aztecs won 13, lost 15.

Veteran Kenny Hale set the pace, both for all-around play and for scoring. He scored 225 points in 28 games to 207 for Don Nuttall, freshman forward, and was named on the Tribune-Sun's All-C.C.A.A. team. Hale, who was named honorary captain and most valuable player, Herb Tompkins and Bernard Goodbody completed their college basketball careers.

**Coach John Sellwood's** outstanding Junior Varsity team, paced by sharpshooting forward **Vane Olinger**, ran up 24 victories against four defeats for the season.

### **Minor Sports Numerous**

State's wrestling team, which won the U.C.L.A. Intercollegiate Invitational meet, finished second in the Southern Pacific A.A.U. championships and fourth in Far Western A.A.U. championships at Oakland, has set the pace for minor sports to date. The badminton team won the championship in the C.C.A.A. winter sports carnival and the boxers, gymnasts and fencers made


