Choice Grid Tickets Offered to Alumni

Alumni of San Diego State College, in accordance with an agreement with the Alumni Association, are being offered first choice of this year's reserved seat season football tickets, **Barney Carman**, Graduate Manager, announces.

Six home games will be played this fall (not including the Shrine Charity Game, which is promoted independently by the Shriners), and reserved seat season tickets for the six games are being offered for \$7.50, Carman said.

This represents a saving of \$3.00 over the cost of \$1.75 reserve tickets bought individually game-by-game. It is equivalent in cost to six \$1.25 general admissions, but instead of general admission seats it provides a reserved seat for every game in the 50-yard-line section.

Carman said that 601 reserved seats are available in the center 50-yard-line section on the west side both at Aztec Bowl, where five games will be played, and at Balboa Stadium, where the sixth is scheduled. All home games are on Saturday nights.

Here's how Alumni may get first choice of seats: Public sale of season tickets will begin Aug. 22, but all Alumni orders received BEFORE that date will be filled first in the order of their receipt.

Clip out the season ticket order blank printed in this issue and forward with your remittance to the Graduate Manager before Aug. 22. Your tickets will be returned by mail, and your ticket worries for San Diego's major football team will be over.

The season ticket covers the following games, all scheduled for Saturday nights at 8:00 p.m.: Oct. 4—Cal Poly in Aztec Bowl; Oct. 18—Occidental College in Aztec Bowl; Nov. 8—Loyola in Aztec Bowl; Nov. 15—Whittier College (Homecoming game) in Aztec Bowl; Nov. 22—Brigham Young University in Balboa Stadium; Nov. 29—Santa Barbara College in Aztec Bowl.

Bill Schutte Promoted to Head Grid Coach . . .

Willie Steele kept San Diego State in the headlines of the sports pages during June and early July, but a series of rapid changes in the physical education and coaching staff also made their share of headlines.

The first major change came when **Dr. Carl H. Young,** who had served both as chairman of the Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation and as Director of Athletics, resigned to become chairman of the physical education department at U.C.L.A. in September.

This led to two popular promotions within the department, the first when Dr. Walter R. Hepner, president, named William L. (Gander) Terry as division chairman succeeding Young, and the second when Terry immediately appointed Charles R. Smith as Director of Athletics.

Then came the move that surprised

(Bill) Schutte** would succeed him as head coach.

Despite the surprise the sudden move occasioned, it met with general approval.

SCHUTTE IS EX-HILLER

Schutte, a 1929 graduate of San Diego High School, is widely known in San Diego and is expected to have a popular following as the Aztecs' first "home town" football coach in nearly two decades.

He was graduated from University of Idaho in 1933 after a brilliant athletic career in both football and baseball. Before becoming Terry's assistant last February he had served as assistant coach at San Diego High from 1935 to 1940, and as assistant coach at Kansas State since 1940, except for service as a Navy officer during the war.

Terry will remain on the football staff as an assistant, as will Charlie Smith. Charles (Choc) Sportsman, track coach, will coach the Freshman football team.

KEEPING UP WITH WILLIE

Although beset by a persistent injury jinx, Willie Steele, the greatest broadjumper the world has seen since Jesse Owens, added the two top championships of the year to his collection during recent weeks.

In the National Intercollegiate championships at Salt Lake City, he practically sailed out of the pit with a spectacular leap of 26 feet, 6 inches. This is only 21/4 inches short of Owens' world record and is the second greatest jump in recorded field history. Officials refused to allow a N.C.A.A. record, however, because of a five-mile wind.

Two weeks later in the National A.A.U. championships at Lincoln, Neb., Willie successfully defended his title at 24 feet, $91/_4$ inches, although jumping only twice after re-injuring his heel.

It looks like the Olympics for sure next year for Willie.




