Harriette Marshall, Joe Souzzo Head 1948 Alumni Slate

Annual Election Will Be Held in October

Twenty-six members of the San Diego State College Alumni Association have been selected by the Nominating Committee as candidates for Association offices for 1948 in the annual elections

to be held in October.

Topping the Nominating Committee's slate are Joe Suozzo '43 and Mrs. Harriette Marshall '32 as candidates for president, succeeding Bob Breitbard '41, whose term expires Dec. 31. Suozzo is the present first vice-president and Mrs. Marshall is a member of the Board of Directors and has been active in the Alumni Association for many years.

Departing from last year's procedure, the Nominating Committee selected two candidates for each office (except Corresponding Secretary) and named 19 candidates for the 10 vacancies in the Board of Directors for a two-year term

beginning Jan. 1, 1948.

Patricia Dew, Ex-'42, was the committee's only nominee for Corresponding Secretary since she was appointed to fill a vacancy only in July of this year.

The Alumni membership at large may place additional candidates on the official ballot by means of petitions. The constitution provides that any member in good standing may be nominated for an office by petition signed by 25 Alumni members in good standing. Petitions should be in the Executive Secretary-Treasurer's office by Oct. 7.

The Nominating Committee appointed by Breitbard consisted of Robert Barbour '30, Charles Wilson '46, Mrs. Artha Tyler Barbour '28, Catherine Wueste '43 and Robert J. Williams '47. Miss Wueste was ill when the committee met and Mrs. Sue Cornell Byrne, Ex-'38, sub-

stituted for her.



Dean Ault Retires After 48 Years







Aztecs Expect Powerful Line Despite Losses From '46 Team

What will the Aztecs show in football this year?

Well, despite an unusually heavy turnover of material—only 12 of last year's 26 varsity lettermen are back, although only three were graduated—prospects are that the Aztecs will field another powerful line, perhaps equal to last year's, which could hold its own in any company.

The backfield, however, with the exception perhaps of the fullback spot, remains the big question.

The Aztecs will perform this season from the split T formation now being installed by William H. (Bill) Schutte, new head coach.

The 12 lettermen returning are George Coleman and Benny Edens, centers;


Barney Carman, Graduate Manager, reports that season football tickets at a reduced rate still are available, although indications are that the 601-seat reserved center section may be sold out before the local season opener with Cal Poly on Oct. 4. Season tickets for six local games (not including the Shrine game) sell for \$7.50, a saving of \$3.00 over the game-by-game cost. They are on sale at Stanley Andrews (Downtown), Walker's Men's Dept. and Whitney's Sports Goods Dept.

Keith Curry, guard; Jim Boles, tackle; Lloyd Cassady, end; Bob Tomlinson, Jack Kaiser, John Simcox and Barney Newlee, halfbacks, and Hub Foote, Stewart Worden and Jess Bryant, fullbacks.

As this was written (early in September), Coleman, Curry and Boles seem like certain starters in the line, although Edens will give Coleman a tough scrap. The other guard opposite Curry should be well taken care of by **George Brown**, All-American at Navy in 1943. Brown resigned from the Navy to take a premedical course at State and has one year of eligibility. Two husky junior college transfers, **Joe Dowd** from San Bernardino and **Marvin Piper** from Santa Ana, give good reserve strength.

Decision of All-Conference Al Sawaya and husky Bob Kaiser not to return to college left Boles as the only veteran tackle, but three big newcomers promise to take care of the problem. They are Tom Dahms, 225 pounds, former San Diego High star ;Al Fodor, 240 pounder from Long Beach J. C., and Don Cannon, 220 pounds, from El Centro.

Bob Rogers, 190 pounds, transfer from Kansas State, seems established at one

end, while Cassady, Larry Berger, 1945 letterman back from Army service, and Dick Adair, San Bernardino J. C. transfer, are leading candidates for the other starting job.

The fullback spot in the backfield should be no problem, what with Foote, Worden and Bryant all returning and a Muir Tech J. C. transfer, Dick Simmons, also showing to advantage.

John Simcox, last year's top yardage maker as a halfback, seems to have the inside track at the all-important quarterback spot where all the T system plays start. Jim Davis, transfer from Santa Ana J. C.; Art Filson, up from the junior varsity, and Kenny Bonatus, passing star of the 1945 varsity who was in the Army last year, are other top quarterback candidates. All are new to the T, however.

Speed and versatility abound among the top halfback hopefuls, including veterans Jack Kaiser and Tomlinson; Dick McKee, jayvee letterman, and two sparkling newcomers, Ken Mitchell from Santa Ana J. C. and Scatback Joe Riccobono from Long Beach J. C. Barney

(18x22) Newlee's accurate toe will take care of the extra points.
