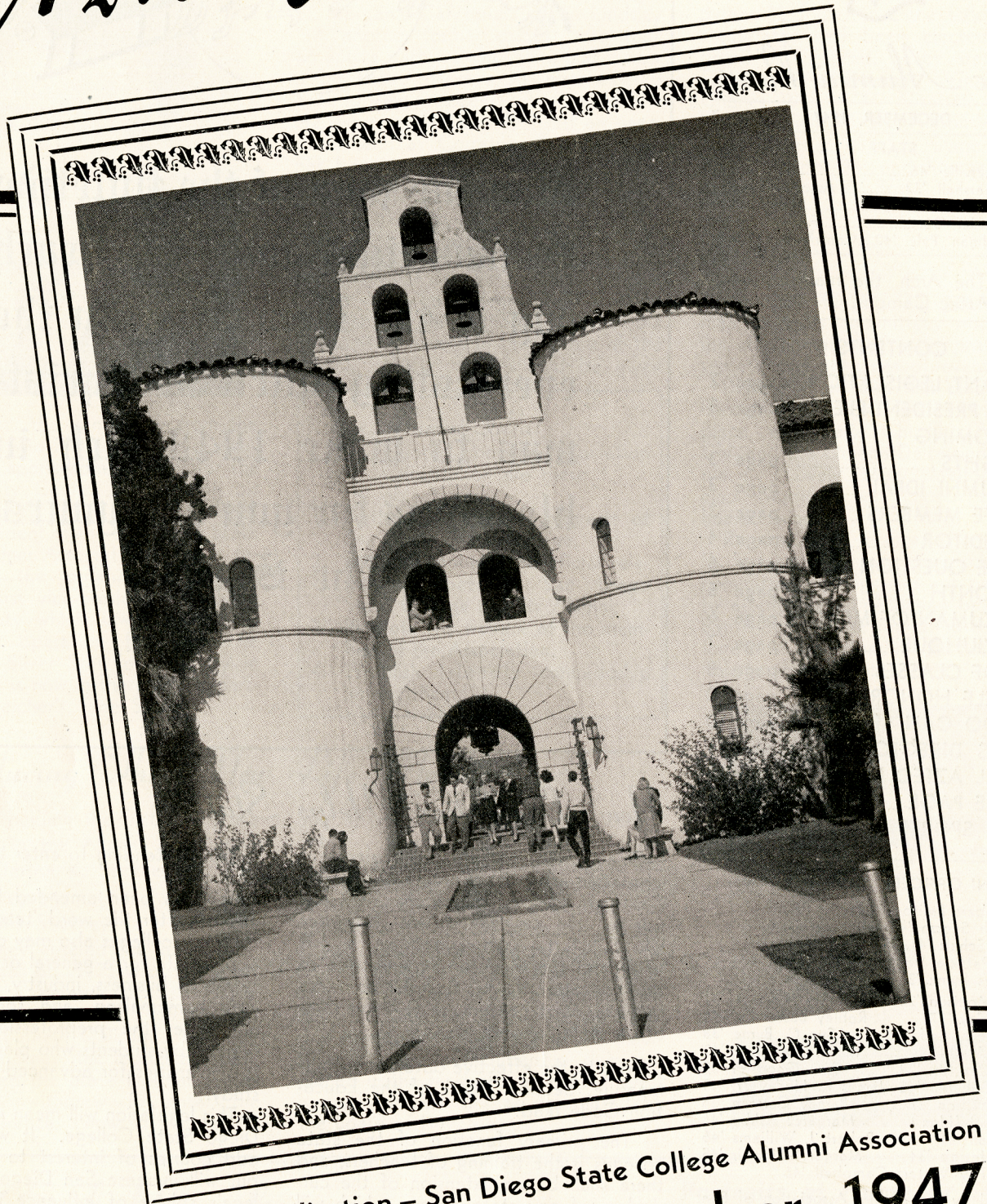

New Legislation Helps State

One of the most important pieces of legislation affecting the state colleges of California enacted during the 1947 session of the Legislature was Assembly Bill 1530. It was the intent of this bill to amend the then current language of the Education Code in order to make possible an expansion of the functions of the state colleges.

Prior to the effective date of this new measure, Section 20301 of the Education Code read:

"The primary function of the state colleges is the training of teachers, and there shall be no extension of the curriculum of any state college which will carry it into any other field of higher education. As a secondary function, courses in liberal arts may be given, but the course shall be only such as are appropriate as courses of instruction for

students intending to enter the teaching profession."

This has been amended to read beginning after the word 'teachers':

"State colleges also may offer courses appropriate for a general or liberal education as business, industry, public services, homemaking, and social service; and offer the preprofessional courses needed by students who plan to transfer to universities for advanced professional study."

This legislation will mean much to San Diego State College. It will not only add courses of interest to the alumni, but will increase San Diego State College's sphere of influence in the California system of education. This bill was introduced in the Legislature by Kathryn T. Niehouse at the request of Dr. Walter R. Hepner, president of the college.

4. Establish friendly comradeship among them."

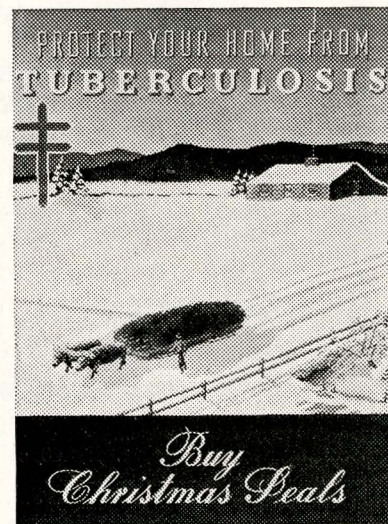
Introducing Three New Life Members

Honor of holding the first family life membership in the Alumni Association goes to Jefferson K. Stickney, Jr., San Diego attorney and former Alumni president, and Mrs. Stickney.

Mr. Stickney entered the Junior College in the fall of 1917, when it was located on the campus at San Diego High, and transferred in 1919 to University of Southern California to study law. Mrs. Stickney, the former Elizabeth Lee, attended the State Normal School in 1922-23, withdrew to enter the "Southern Branch," now U. C. L. A.,

and later obtained a teacher's certificate.

Dr. Harding, a San Diego dentist, was active in student affairs during his days on the campus and is remembered as the editor of both Del Sudoste and the Paper Lantern (now The Aztec) in their first year. He is a member of Epsilon Eta. These three new life memberships bring the balance of the Life Membership Investment Fund to \$487.50. Four-fifths of all life membership dues are placed in the fund and only the interest is used for activities as designated by the Board of Directors.

"A break in business conditions?"

Dr. Roy E. Cameron first joined the faculty of San Diego State College in 1929 and has since become Professor of Economics heading the Department of Social Economics. He has long been considered a business and investment authority. Dr. Cameron interprets current economic conditions to make his prediction of business in 1948.

BUSINESS IN 1948

Business today is very good and profits are reaching all time highs. With full employment and with many companies operating at full capacity business indices are not likely to record higher levels of production next year. In fact, it is expected that the Federal Reserve Board Index of Production will move downward during the coming months.

This does not mean, however, that 1948 will be a year of recession. Assuming that we do have a serious crackup in Europe or a sharp dip in commodity

prices, business prospects for 1948 are very good. Most of our basic industries are in a strong position and business leaders are optimistic concerning prospects for their companies. Steel companies, operating close to capacity, are unable to produce steel fast enough to meet the demand. That condition is likely to last through 1948. The electric power industry will need to expand facilities greatly to meet the demand for power in the months ahead. The farmers of the country have purchasing power sufficient to keep the agricultural implement industry operating at full capacity for months to come. And so it is with other industries, accumulated orders to keep the basic industries operating at very high levels make it likely that business will not run into serious difficulty in the near future.

There are, however, a number of unfavorable factors which cloud the picture. The foreign scene is far from reassuring. Shortage of dollars may result in a decrease of exports unless we supply the funds with which to buy our products. Inflation constitutes a real threat to our economy. While further inflation may provide a stimulant to business it is certain to create serious maladjustments to threaten business stability. Higher living costs will tend to price low income groups out of the market. Severe price adjustments may be painful to business when they occur. High prosperity and inflation always generate con-

ditions which are disturbing and must be eradicated. That probably involves a downturn in business of rather serious proportions, but the timing of these changes in the business cycle is difficult.

The favorable factors appear to be strong enough to carry us through the remainder of this year and well into 1948 without a serious drop in business activity. Depression is unlikely so long as inventories are not excessive and plant capacity is not over-expanded, neither of which conditions exist today. Strong demand for goods and large purchasing power to buy these products are additional favorable factors existing at present. Although production indices are likely to ease down somewhat in 1948, we are not likely to see depression conditions during the year. However, we must admit that circumstances make prediction of the months ahead very difficult. With a serious crackup in Europe or with a rapid drop in prices, recession conditions could develop very quickly. Furthermore, the next major move in business will be downward and changes preceding depression are already developing. Some leading finan-

cial services have been bearish for some time and increasingly so with the passage of time.

While recognizing much divergence of expert opinion and various uncertainties in the present situation, my prediction is that no serious break in business conditions will occur during the early months of the year. It is quite probable that the year 1948 will record a satisfactory level of business.

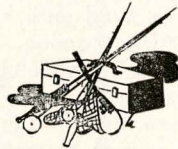

"Headed Homecoming"

Taking his rightful place among the Aztec luminaries is Gordon Wiggins, chosen this month because of his exceptionally fine work as chairman of Homecoming. This year's festivities will long be remembered for the success of the campus and off-campus activities, the beauty of the floats, the enthusiastically received football victory, and the quiet efficiency of the chairman.

Gordon was born in Calgary, Alberta, where he lived until he was eight years old. After coming to the States he tarried briefly in Duluth and Denver before making his home in National City. 1928 saw him finishing his junior high school days at Memorial, and from there he went on to the Grey Castle, graduating in 1931.

At State Gordon's talent for leadership did not go unrecognized. He was president of Delta Pi Beta, editor of Del Sudoeste, and a member of Blue Key and the Student Council. His college career was continued at University of California, where he received his general secondary credential, after graduating from San Diego State in 1936.

For two years after Berkeley he worked for the Retail Credit Association, after which he joined the staff at San Diego High School as a teacher of commercial subjects and financial adviser to the faculty and student body. His ability then took him to the central office where he served as assistant to the business manager of the San Diego City Schools for two years, after which he returned to San Diego High for another

Ilacatzihque

Ilacatzihque (pronounced: E-lock-ot-see-ooo-kay) is an old Aztec word that Dr. Spencer Rogers '27 has found in his studies of secondary information. It is the name of the award that was pinned on the left shoulder of members of the tribe who instilled courage and lifted morale in time of crisis.

The Board of Directors of the Alumni Association have adopted Ilacatzihque, or "The word" as it is more commonly referred to, and will present it framed on parchment with the proper inscription as a symbol of appreciation to those who have favored the college with their

generosity of service and money.

Dr. Rogers has been a staff member of the Anthropology Department since 1930, after completing study at Claremont and the University of Southern California.
