CELEBRATION '84 A DECADE OF PRIDE The San Diego Theme "UNITY AND MORE IN '84"

The National Theme

On Columbus Day weekend, the second annual Pride Coordinators Conference was held here in San Diego. Over 60 delegates from 18 cities (New York, Boston, Atlanta, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Albuquerque, and many more) were in attendance trippling the number of cities attending the first conference in Boston.

On Sunday afternoon, conference delegates voted for the first time to have a national theme, "Unity & More in '84." Many cities across the nation have chosen to adopt this as their individual celebration theme. Others, including San Diego, have decided to incorporate the national theme along with their own local theme.

San Diego has chosen as its theme "Celebration '84 A Decade of Pride." In 1975 we held our first Pride March and now, ten years later, we are honoring those people who had the courage to take to the streets in our behalf.

NICOLE MURRAY

Honorary Grand Marshal Keynote Speaker



It comes as no surprise to many in San Diego to learn that Nicole Murray has been officially nominated as a candidate to be honored in August by the ADVOCATE as one of the outstanding men and women who have made significant contributions to the gay movement in the United States. As the ADVOCATE once stated, "Nicole is the most colorful and controversial figure in San Diego, but he's been committed, hardworking, and a highly effective fundraiser for the gay community "

Nicole was born in San Bernardino, California, and was raised in a very Catholic. Mexican-American family His only brother, Ray, is also gay Nicole became involved in politics at an early age and was even elected president of the Western States Federation of Teenage Republicans (T.A.R.) and was on the paid staff of many state and congressional campaigns including that of the Hon. former Congressman Robert R. Barry. Among the most interesting campaigns he worked on were Richard Nixon's 1962 campaign for governor and Senator Barry Goldwater's 1964 presidential campaign.

Almost 15 years ago, Nicole arrived in San Diego and became a recognized gay leader and spokesperson. He was elected the first president of the San Diego Gay Activist Alliance, became president of the first gay Republican club served on the board of the Gay Center for Social Services and was elected Empress of San Diego three times (IV-VIII XI).

Among the many things Nicole had done is leading demonstrations in front of the County Jail (against brutalities to gays) and the Court House (to protest police harassment); founding the first gay/lesbian scholarship (The San Diego Harvey Milk Memorial); starting Eagle Productions and its Gay San Diego Contest; the Nicky Awards, Gay California Pageants; Hillcrest Awards and many more. His events have raised tens of thousands of dollars to benefit the lesbian/gay and the nongay communities.

Nicole Murray holds the distinction of being the first and only gay citizen to be honored by the Mayor of San Diego with a Community Service Award.

As active as ever, Nicole is currently president of the Board of the San Diego County AIDS ASSISTANCE FUND; fist vicepresident of San Diego Log Cabin Republican Club; vice-chairman of the board for SAN DIEGO AIDS PROJECT and member of the board of governors of the UNITED SAN DIEGO ELECTION COMMITTEE (USDEC). Nicole now resides in the Florida Canyon area of San Diego with his lover of two years, model Dirk Moon.

It is indeed fitting that Nicole Murray is the honorary Grand Marshal of San Diego's 10th anniversary celebration as he was involved with the very first one in 1975 as one of the speakers at the first Rally and has participated in almost every Pride event since. Indeed, San Diego's Nicole Murray has truly become a legend, and not only in his own mind!

REVEREND HOWARD WILLIAMS

Founder of the local chapter of Metropolitan Community Church and currently pastor of MCC-By The-Sea, Howard has worked in and for our community for many years. He was the treasurer of the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center for a number of years and is best described as a thoughtful, concerned member of our community.

CAROLYN INNES

Founder of the Gav Nurses Alliance. Carolyn was a member of the Board of Directors of the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center during some of its most turbulent years. She also served as an Interim Director of the Center and was invaluable in keeping it on course. Carolyn is known for her keen sense of justice and her committment to the building of our community. Carolyn has earned her place in our community as a respected voice of reason.



REVEREND JOHN HOSES

One of the first pastors of MCC in San Diego, the Reverend John came out in this community long before it was "safe" to do so. He is described as a very caring man, "always there when you needed him." His tenure at MCC ensured the survival of the fledgling chapter. "Papa John" as he is affectionately known is well loved by the hundreds of lives he has touched.

Judge CAROLYN 'SAM' SAMPSON

Carolyn, native of Minnesota, completed her BA degree in business education/teaching at the University of Northern Colorado. After teaching for four years in Stockton, CA, she moved to San Diego in 1969. Carolyn, better known as "Sam," opened The Apt. December 24, 1974, with Peach.

The Apt. was created with a philosophy of love and acceptance of all human beings. And Carolyn carries this out through her personal life. She says, "my life's goal is to be active in the process of world transformation. I'm a follower of the Church of Religious Science—Terry Cole-Whitaker because it is a positive, supportive and loving spiritual belief system which works for me."

One of the new ideas Carolyn has adopted for The Apt. is the forming of a Love & Support Group open to everyone. She states that the philosophy in forming the group was:

"Let's work at creating a loving and supporting environment that will nurture all human beings as a gay culture. Let us heighten our awareness to the level where all negativity disappears... to the ultimate level of "unconditional love." Let this become the "new reflection" of the Gay community."

"Love lift us up where we belong."

Also, she has an impressive list



of presentations to her credit. She has presented papers and/or been a panel member at: American Nurses Association National Convention S.F. Texas Nurses Association Convention Boston Gay Community Health Conference Gay Academic Union, New York City First National Gay Health Conference, Washington, D.C. David Susskind Show, New York City Gay Way Radio, Boston Channel 8, San Diego Carolyn now works full-time in community nursing and part-time in her own holistic health nursing practice. She says: "I have retired from the Gay activist scene to rest and allow others to take their turn in the fray. It is pleasant to reflect on those past times and to have my work remembered on this tenth anniversary of San Diego's Gay Pride."

Judge AL BEST


Prior to arriving in San Diego in 1975, Al Best served as a White House appointee to the National Science Foundation for six years under Presidents Nixon and Ford. He worked with the Mariner 9 Program on the photographing of Mars.

In 1978/79 Al served as Spokesperson for The Gay Alliance for Equal Rights, was a former Board member of the Gay Center, and founding Board member of Stepping Stone. In April, 1979, Mr Best became the first openly gay person to run for public office in San Diego County by announcing his candidacy for



city council and finished fifth out of a field of eleven.

He was the recipient of the 1980 "Gay Pride" Award.



Judge BRIDGET WILSON

Age: 34. Occupation: Licensed Vocational Nurse. Education: Bachelor of Fine Arts, Creighton University. Organizational Affiliations: Current Administrative Vice-President, San Diego Democratic Club, San Diego's largest gay and lesbian political organization. Coordinator of Gay Vote '84, a project of the San Diego Democratic Club to register 5,000 to 10,000 new voters. Member of executive board of the San Diego Democratic Club as director of women's issues. As such, helped to organize the Blood Sisters blood drive, a nationally recognized event. The drive augmented the blood supply for the community during the AIDS crisis when many gay men are unable to donate blood. It helped to combat the anti-gay hysteria brought on by the AIDS crisis.

Former volunteer co-director of military counseling at the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center.

Former member of volunteer staff, Center for Servicemen's Rights.

Member National Organization for Women and San Diego NOW.

Co-founder of committee for Solidarity-San Diego, a program to encourage businesses in the gay and lesbian community to subscribe to a policy of nondiscrimination based on gender, race, age, sexual orientation, nationality, national origin or religion. Some 50 community businesses have signed this statement.

Former staff writer for *Thurs*day's *Child*, a lesbian publication.

Contributing author to a manual on counseling gay men and lesbians in the armed forces, soon to be published.

Judge THE REV. DAVID FARRELL



The Rev. David Farrell is the pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church in San Diego, a position he has held since 1975. He has served as chair of the Southwest District Board of Home Missions, the Metropolitan Community Church Commission on Government Structures and Systems, and the Elders' Task Force on Inclusive Language.

The Rev. Farrell is a member of numerous social, business, and political organizations. He is a charter member of the San Diego Democratic Club, and a member of the Select Search and Screening Council on State Commission Council. The Rev. Farrell has conducted lectures and seminars on human sexuality, on homosexuality in the Bible, on contemporary social problems in business, and on gay people and the law. He has lectured numerous groups including university classes, the San Diego Police Department, and several social and professional organizations.

The Reverend David was instrumental in the campaign against Proposition 6 forming Christians for Social Action, a broad-based community group responsible for a countywide advertising campaign to defeat the proposition. He is currently producer of a television broadcast from MCC San Diego called *Reflections of MCC*.

The Reverend David was the driving force of the successful effort to move the San Diego congregation from the Fern Street church into the beautiful new building on 30th Street.

More recently, the Rev. Farrell took a leading role in the community effort to address the problems created by Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome through Take Aim At AIDS, in cooperation with the San Diego Physicians for Human Rights. His leadership in fundraising efforts, in education about the issues, and in providing moral support to those directly or indirectly affected by AIDS is especially noteworthy.

EVA MARIE DECKER








JAY SLOAN

Lesbianism. Ten years of lesbian activism, right here in San Diego! And we're here to celebrate it with a festival, a parade, and some thought, I hope.

We *should* celebrate these past ten years of struggle, and grassroots organizing—the successes and the sisterhood we have created.

We should celebrate the energy we have put into our discussions of race, class, power, separatism, motherhood, and physical abilities —a few of the issues we tackled in the course of producing our events.

We should celebrate some important organizations and businesses that a handful of women put together and we all enjoyed: The Women's Bookstore, Las Hermanas, Wing Cafe, Charmed Circle Books, *Feminists Communication*, and *Thursday's Child*. These places and publications helped create a sense of community and culture that still lingers.

We should celebrate the organizations that our untried but ardent political ideals gave rise to: Lesbians for Political Action, Lesbians of Color, and Lesbian Solidarity. All were true



community groups that attempted to accomplish large events with no money, experience, or connections—and sometimes did!

We have a great deal to celebrate here, that's certain. We have our bars and our sports teams and our social organizations. We have our women-owned businesses and we know where it is cool to kiss. All of which says very positive things about the community we have created in the last decade, about those groups and individuals that have spoken out for lesbian rights.


However, it is also clear that past success may engender new complacence. In this beautiful city, in a progressive state, it is very easy to believe every day is just "another day in paradise."

Maybe we would rather wince and look the other way when we read about the defeat of AB-1. Or maybe we could try ignoring altogether the surprise attack on Hillcrest by right-wing homophobes—that parade that left some of us feeling like hit and run victims. Maybe we should chalk up our still struggling Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center to lack of leadership. And what about the women's spaces that San Diego lesbians once had at their disposal?

Perhaps, now it is time for a renewed approach. At this *Celebration '84* we can recommit ourselves to our original goals.

We can truly celebrate our tenth anniversary by recommitting our energy, finances and resources to the advancement of lesbian rights. We can recommit ourselves to voting twice this year-in June and November. We can recommit ourselves to writing a check to a lesbian organization today. Regardless of whether it is the Women's Caucus at the Democratic Club, the Lesbian Rights Task Force at NOW, the new publication, As The Shoe Fits, or your favorite rugby team-DO IT! They are all important! We can and must recommit ourselves to voicing our agenda within the gay men's and feminist communities.

We can, perhaps most radically, recommit ourselves to empowering all lesbians and listening to each other with utterly open minds.

This neighborhood has a small infestation of bible-toting Fundies. These queer creatures feed on Anger, Hatred and Fear. Their lifeblood is media attention.


The best way to combat them is:

STONEWALL RIOT

The following are excerpts from a workshop presented at the second annual National Pride Coordinators Conference, October 1983, San Diego, California.

My name is Toni Gambino. I'm 32 now and the moderator of Christopher Street Liberation Day Committee.

The Stonewall Inn was a small local bar in Greenwich Village. The patrons were all drag queens and gay men. women were not · allowed but they had their own bar just down the street. At the time of the riots I was not out to my family. That night, June 28, 1969, I was only 17 or 18. I remember my father coming home from work and saying to my mother "there was a riot in the village, the homosexuals had rioted in the streets and they (the police) had fought back and it was a shame the way the police were beating up the homosexuals."

Who was my father? He was the assistant police commissioner for the City of New York. There I was sitting at the table while he was talking about it and I was not out to my family. He was saying how there was a lot of graft going on in the village, and how the police had come to shake down the bar again and that the drag queens, the transpeople, were being harassed. And they had fought back by throwing garbage cans and bottles through the windows. He thought it was

about time the gay people fought back. And I'm sitting there thinking "but you don't know that your son is gay," and my mother is saying "well how many people are getting hurt and what's going on?". My father said that his shift had ended at 12 o'clock and he really didn't want to stay to see the way the policemen were wading in and beating everyone. The gays were fighting back and even turned over the paddywagon, my father was saying this with joy and he sounded happy at what was going on.


You hear a lot of people say that it was only men that night who started it, but it was united effort for the first time against police harassment. OK, here's what happened that night. The bar was full of transpeople and gay men, the lesbians had a bar about half a block away. The women saw what was going on and they joined right in.


Things really haven't changed much today. The raids still go on, a bar was raided just last week, but now they raid to check liquor licenses or what they call a "fire drill" they count how many people are in the bar and if you're over by one forget it.

Today, as we look back over those fifteen years to Stonewall we can be pleased at the progress that has been made. Many states and some cities have added "sexual Preference" to the existing fair housing and nondiscrimination bills. More and more men and women are accepting being openly Gay and are no longer afraid to share their lifestyle with their friends and family. As a group we have united together to fight common foes such as Anita Bryant, John Briggs or Coors Beer. We have shown that we will not stand for misrepresentation and discrimination. However, lest we sit back in complacency, we must always be aware of the storm clouds on the horizon. Here in San Diego and across California we can still be fired from our jobs or refused employment, we can be thrown out of our houses and turned down from receiving financial aid, just because we are GAY.

So, yes we have come a long way since the Stonewall Riot but there is still a long road ahead.




WILDE'S has already established its position as a major advertiser in the national gay

NORTH COUNTY GAY HISTORY


North San Diego County's Gay and Lesbian population is mostly made up of military, retired military, retired actors, and people who like a quiet atmosphere and suburban setting. It is easily accessible to both Los Angeles and San Diego, and with the warm, dry climate is ideal for senior citizens and individuals who enjoy that atmosphere.

North County encompasses a large area: Oceanside on the west, Rainbow on the north, Borrego Springs on the east, and extends as far south as Poway. Also included are Fallbrook, Camp Pendleton, Escondido, Carlsbad, Leucadia, Encinitas, Solana Beach, Cardiff by the Sea, Rancho Bernardo, San Marcos, Valley Center, and Julian, just to name a few.

The first Gay/Lesbian establishment in North County was a bar called Denny's in Oceanside. Located on Third near the beach, it was followed by another bar, The Capri, owned by Herb and Jerry.

In 1974-75, Camp Pendleton's commanding officer, General Hoffman, a homophobe from the word go, put The Capri "off limits" to all military personnel, and military police were posted outside the main door. The outrage of the Gay/Lesbian community fell on the deaf ears of General Hoffman. So an attorney's fund was started and money was raised, from San Francisco to San Diego. Both Camp Pendleton and General Hoffman were taken to federal court where the judge ruled "that NO ONE could deny a man an honest living." Today, The Capri still offers a place where Gays/Lesbians can gather.

Palomar Metropolitan Community Church was started in 1975 by the Rev. Howard Williams. They met in Escondido and when they decided to move the church to Oceanside, the name was changed to Oceanside MCC. Also started in Escondido in 1978 was an organization known as GAE (Gay Activities in



Escondido). Organized by Doug Moore as a social service club, the group met in a small bookkeeping office. In 1980, GAE merged with another group founded by Jon Lewis which was meeting on the coast. The new group become NCGA (North County Gay Association) and now meets at the newest Gay bar in North County, Panchali's.

Jim Weatherall, a longtime force behind North County, tried to start the first Gay/Lesbian center in 1980. Unfortunately, the city of Oceanside applied pressure, and the center had to close.

Since 1981, North County has grown rapidly. Meeting space became a problem, and there were no adequate facilities to hold functions. That is, until Roy, Brandy and Ralph of the Mission Bowl offered the use of the large meeting room at the Bowl.

Things have been fairly quiet for the past three years. The population of North County, as in the past, will continue to support the Gay/Lesbian Pride events. They represent us all.






