

Statement of Purpose

Upon the inability of the new San Diego Lambda Pride group to produce this year's events, an ad hoc committee was formed in the latter part of January 1988. With just over 4 months and many hours of hard work ahead, new ideas and new blood, old ideas and old blood were melded together and our Pride celebration began to unfold. For the first time we had a choice of three different sites for the Festival: Hancock Street, the old Sears parking lot in Hillcrest and the old Balboa Naval Hospital parking lot. The Rally was moved back to the Organ Pavilion, and this year the Parade will be halted for a "Minute of Silence" to remember those no longer with us.

The largest Lesbian & Gay Pride Celebration in San Diego is possible for many reasons, from businesses who donated money to volunteers who donated time. ParadeFest '88 is proud to bring you these Pride Events.



Judy Forman, the woman, is a loving, powerful person with a penchant for healing, who is always supportive of the Lesbian and Gay Community. It is because of this protective, loving support that Judy has the respect of many diverse and varied groups of people ("... and individuals," she says, "never forget the individuals!") It is almost impossible to talk about her without talking about her restaurant The Big Kitchen. Years ago when the Lesbian and Gay Community Center was undergoing changes and couldn't find a place to hold its Board meeting, Judy offered The Big Kitchen, and made sure there was plenty of hot coffee, at no charge. She was instrumental in the formation of our Lesbian and Gay Freedom Band and has always managed to find a place in her heart, and her restaurant for any poor soul looking for a place to feel welcome.

She is equally comfortable pouring a sassy cuppa coffee for the Congressman (offering him some well thought out advice in the process) as she is pouring fresh orange juice for a homeless woman (offering her a job washing dishes at the same time).

One of the aims of the Lesbian and Gay Movement is to be as equally accepted as anyone else, without having to apologize for who we are. At Judy's place, and in her presence, we have reached that goal. We are loved for who and what we are. Our community would have to look far and wide to find a more supportive friend than Judy Forman. Besides, when considering who to honor, we at *ParadeFest '88* couldn't think of anyone we knew who loves a PARADE more than Judy.



CLINT JOHNSON

Clint Johnson is a long-time resident of San Diego, moving here from Los Angeles 28 years ago. He is a native of Phoenix, Arizona and a graduate of Arizona State University who pursued a career in teaching and the insurance field until he opened the Show Biz Supper Club in 1968. In 1978 he took over Bee Jays, then at the downtown location, merging the two in 1982.

Mr. Johnson has been a dedicated community worker doing extensive initial fundraising for the Metropolitan Community Church, Center for Social Services (a.k.a. Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center), and continues to host benefits for numerous San Diego community organizations upon request at Bee Jay's.

Clint is a founding Board Member of the AIDS Assistance Fund of San Diego County, a founding member of the San Diego Gay Rodeo Association, founder and choreographer of the internationally renowned "Bee Jay Broncos," and was Emperor XIV of the Imperial Court of San Diego.

Among the many awards he has received from the San Diego community include: "Man of the Year"; "Humanitarian of the Year"; "Show Director"; "Choreographer of the Year"; "Mayor of Hillcrest"; and he is a member of the "San Diego Hall of Fame".

HONORARY GRAND MARSHAL

SHARON KOWALSKI

Sharon Kowalski was chosen as this year's Honorary Grand Marshal in conjunction with Pride Events around the country. Sharon is being so honored because her lover Karen Thompson has been denied access to her since a near fatal car accident several years ago. This accident left Sharon in a near vegetative state. For a time, Karen worked with her in the hospital and was able to rehabilitate her enough to have her type messages on a typewriter. One such message said, "I love you. Please get me out of here." After learning the nature of her relationship to their daughter, Sharon's parents forbade any contact with Karen ever again. Karen took the case to court and won visiting privileges, whereupon Sharon's parents simply removed her from the hospital and moved her to a different state. Karen is very worried that Sharon is no longer receiving proper care as she has regressed into a fetal position and is no longer communicating with anyone.

This case points out the legal non-recognition of our relationships. Lovers have no legal rights to visitation in

This case points out the legal non-recognition of our relationships. Lovers have no legal rights to visitation in case of disability. We have no rights in cases of mental instability and have no rights in case of death. Parents and other ''immediate family'' can supercede the wishes and needs of the lover, even override written instructions from the deceased should they choose to. In heterosexual marriages, the spouse has preceding legal rights, whereas in our relationships, the spouse has none.

There is a nationwide effort to petition the parents and the courts to reinstate Karen Thompson as the legal guardian of her spouse. All lesbians and gay men and their friends are urged to become involved, as this could become a tragic case in your life. And remember, when you see the empty wheelchair in the Parade, Sharon Kowalski is one of us and deserves our support. Bring Sharon home!

Front Runners San Diego

Front Runners San Diego was formed seven years ago for the purpose of providing encouragement and support to lesbians and gay men interested in running. Front Runners San Diego is part of a large network of Front Runner clubs. Sixteen North American cities, including two Canadian cities, have an active Front Runner club.

Front Runners San Diego has grown steadily throughout the years. Membership now, including runners and walkers, has grown to

approximately 120.

One of the most striking characteristics of Front Runners San Diego is the diversity of its membership. Runners and walkers of all levels, whether beginning, recreational or competitive, participate in two weekly runs and various 5K runs, 10K runs, half-marathons and marathons throughout the year.

In addition to running-related activities, Front Runners holds various social events for club members. Pasta feeds are held the night before major runs, and the club puts on an annual banquet and holiday parties.



The Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center was established in 1973 to provide support to San Diego's Lesbian and Gay Men's Community. The Center offers a wide range of programs. AIDS and Non-AIDS Counseling are available for both individuals and groups. The AIDS response program includes counseling for HIV+, ARC, AIDS, family members, lovers, friends and the worried well. AIDSrelated groups available include: HIV+, Women and AIDS issues, and a PWA group. For people interested in a more nontraditional approach to services, the Center is establishing a program based on a holistic approach to wellness. The first group of many in this program is ALIVE and WELL, a positive approach to living.

The Center also offers many non-AIDS programs including individual and couples counseling. Center groups include: Lesbian Coming Out Group, Gay Men's Coming Out Group, Lesbian Support Group, the third Sunday of the month Lesbian Educational Program and a closed Lesbian Couples Group. Other Center programs include Military Counseling, Speakers Bureau, Phone Counseling and an Information and Referral for Lesbian and Gay Businesses in San Diego. The Center also is the meeting place for several other community groups: Gay Youth Alliance, Slightly Older Lesbians, Men's Center, San Diego Lesbian and Gay Archives and the RISE program. 

THE PARADE

Saturday, June 11, 1988, will see thousands of people lining the streets of Hillcrest, awaiting the appearance of the first contingent in this, the 14th Annual Lesbian & Gay Pride Parade. The diversity that makes our community so unique can be seen among such entries as S.A.G.E. (Seniors Active in a Gay Environment), the American Civil Liberties Union, the Lesbian & Gay Men's Community Center, North County Gay Association, the Flame, San Diego Sisterhood and even an Avon lady. As in past parades we will be joined by groups from outside San Diego County. Highlighting the Parade will be Sistah Boom, a lesbian 30-piece percussion group from San Francisco, Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) from Orange County and Supervisor Tom Nolan from San Mateo County.

For the first time in the history of San Diego Lesbian & Gay Pride, the entire Parade will be halted to observe one minute of silence in rememberance of those who have died of AIDS and those who are no longer here to celebrate with us. Over 6,000 lavender and white balloons will be released to signal the beginning of the minute of silence. Balloons will be available

along the Parade route and in the Parade line-up area.

The Parade will step off at 12 noon. It starts at Laurel & 6th, proceeding north on 6th to Thorn, west on Thorn to 5th, turning north on 5th and continuing to Robinson, passing the reviewing stand in the Mayfair parking lot (5th & Robinson), turning east on Robinson to 6th and south on 6th to Balboa Drive, where we will proceed into Balboa Park ending at Laurel.


We have worked very hard these last months to bring to you the very best in entertainment from around the

HELEN REDDY

The first to open the doors in the early 70's for the wave of Australian talent that continues to roll in, Helen Reddy was born into an Australian show business and began performing profes-

sionally as a very early age.

In 1966, having toured the length and breadth of Australia, and been a regular on several television shows, Helen entered a contest which promised the winner a trip to New York and an audition with an American record company. Helen beat out 1,357 other contestants to emerge the winner and left for New York shortly afterwards with her three-year-old daughter in tow. However, she was sloughed off without the promised audition by record company

executives who had been anticipating a male group.

Helen and her daughter stayed on in the United States anyway and after five frustrating years, she contracted with Capitol to make one 45" single record. The song she cut became her debut hit, I Don't Know How To Love Him from Jesus Christ Superstar. But it was a song Helen penned, I Am Woman; that was to become her first number one song, garnering her a Grammy and becoming the anthem for the feminist movement. More top ten material followed and records such as Leave Me Alone (Ruby Red Dress), Angie Baby, Delta Dawn, and You and Me Against The World on gold and platinum selling albums led to an international multimedia career.



Helen has performed live on six continents in such places as Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center in New York, the Royal Albert Hall and the Palladium in London and the Opera House in Sydney. Her television specials have been seen in more than 40 countries and Disney's release of her 1977 film Pete's Dragon on video cassette continues to attract a new generation of fans.

Although she still performs occasionally, most of Helen's time in the past few years has been taken up with writing and actively managing her own production company. In addition to music videos and television specials,

Helen Reddy, Inc. will next year produce its first full-length film, to be shot entirely in Australia.

Of the many honors she has received over a long career, Helen most enjoys the tulip named for her in Holland and grows the reddish-violet bulb in her California garden. Helen served for three years as Commissioner of Parks and Recreation for the State of California. She resides in Santa Monica with her husband, Milton Ruth, her son, and a large dog.


