Dedication In Memory of Deborah L. Fleming June 23, 1954 - May 25, 1990




Deborah L. Fleming was well known as the dynamic Executive Director of Womancare Clinic, and for her strong leadership role in San Diego's pro-choice community.

Throughout her life, Debby worked for justice and peace and deeply cared for women, children and various oppressed minority and ethnic groups. She dedicated her life to the struggle to bring about change.

Educated and trained as a social worker in Wisconsin, Debby worked with children and adolescents. After moving to San Diego, Debby became active in many social and political arenas. She became involved in the gay and lesbian community and was a courageous and tireless leader in the reproductive rights effort.

As an activist, she worked on lesbian healthcare issues in the gay and lesbian community and was a dedicated spokeswoman for the women's healthcare self-help movement. She helped establish the Coalition for Reproductive Choice, and was on the Board of Directors for the National Abortion Federation, the California Reproductive Health Association, and the Federation for Feminist Women's Health Centers.

Though no longer at our side, on this day of gay pride, Debby will be marching with us in our hearts.






What I think is every life in between birth and death is all about growth how much or how little you can grow or whether you can grow at all.

By telling the public that he is qay, John made a significant stride in educating people about the contributions of the lesbian/ gay community. Officer Graham's courage and dedication to the public good are clear from his record.



John is an eleven year veteran of the San Diego Police Department. After working in patrol and traffic assignments, he was selected to work in the Training and Development Division and was later picked for his current position in the **Crime Prevention Unit** of the Public Affairs Division. In his present duties he creates crime prevention programs and speaks to the public on personal safety awareness. John also teaches self defense at Miramar College and at the San Diego Sheriff Department's training academy. In addition, he serves as the Regional Director of the California **Crime Prevention**

Officer's Association, sits on the San Diego County Human Relations Commission Law Enforcement subcommittee

(which recently released the first report of the county's new Hate Crimes Registry) and was one of the founders of the Society Of Law Officers (SOLO.)

Chief Bob Burgreen's warm, continuing support of him has been exem-



plary. Reactions from within the department have been extremely supportive. John's being out allows him to be more active in the gay/ lesbian community and to serve as a role model to young people around the country.





Frank Buttino

Frank Buttino received his B.A. in history from Colgate University. He taught high school social studies, and in July 1969, received an appointment as a Special Agent of the FBI by Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Buttino was assigned to San Diego in 1973. He was one of a handful of FBI agents assigned undercover work Buttino's work in organized crime led to the conviction of several major organized crime figures. He was one of the first FBI Agents selected for specialized training by the Drug Enforcement Administration, and his successful investigation of a corrupt FBI Agent made national headlines. In 1988, Buttino, assigned to foreign counterintelligence and terrorism investigations, led the FBI's investigation of the Sharon Rogers van bombing-one of the most extensive and important in the FBI's history.


Despite Buttino's distinguished record, his valued recognition by nearly every FBI director, and a job performance rating of "superior", once the FBI learned Special Agent Buttino was

homosexual they fired him. In June 1990, Buttino launched a legal battle against the FBI, charging them with discrimination based on sexual orientation. Because of


discrimination against Buttino and other homosexual law enforcement officers, the Society of Law Officers (SOLO) was formed in San Diego in 1990.

Karen Marshall, MSW, has been the Administrative Director and Volunteer Coordinator for The Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center since 1987. She is responsible for day-to-day operations and supervision of the efforts of over 120 volunteers. Karen also develops new programs (she has assisted in the formation of over 6 new programs since her arrival), evaluates the effectiveness of all programs, and places/ trains the large volunteer force that keeps The Center in operation. Prior to accepting her job at The Center, Karen received her MSW from SDSU and worked at a Seniors agency and as an admitting clerk at UCSD Hospital.

The Imperial Court Celebrating 20 Years of Community Service

The "straight" community has the Shriners, the Elks, etc., with all their funny hats and clothing and the gay/lesbian community has its Imperial Courts with all their crowns, gowns, and regalia ... what both groups have in common are outstanding records of charity fundraising and lots of fun events. The Imperial Court is a social community service organization that originated in San Francisco over 26 years ago. It was strictly "camp fun" and, from the beginning, they derived their camp titles ... i.e., "Emperor and Empress" (those who serve one year as the copresidents of the organization; "coronation" (a gala function held once yearly, at which time the Emperor and Empress are elected by communitywide voting). There are now over fifty Imperial Courts throughout the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Most major cities in North America have an Imperial Court in their community and, in essence, they are a chapter in an international organization. The primary goal of the Imperial Courts are to hold functions and fundraisers for the enjoyment of the community, to raise money for charitable organizations, and to help those in the community who are in need of assistance.

On August 3, 1991, the Imperial Court de San Diego will celebrate their 20th Anniversary at the beautiful Omni Hotel with a spectacular event full of pageantry, fun, entertainment, and dancing. The entire community has been invited to attend Coronation 1991 with visiting royalty coming in from throughout North America, including the founder of the Imperial Court System, Empress I Jose of San Francisco, as well as Emperor I Marcus.


Throughout the last two decades, the Imperial Court de San Diego has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars that have benefited countless lesbian/gay organizations and projects. The San Diego Court and its leaders

have been in the forefront of AIDS fundraising and assisting every AIDS agency. The Imperial Court also has an outstanding record of social service work and financial contributions that extend outside of the gay community, including: San Diego County Retarded Children's Association, Underground Railroad for Battered Women, San Diego Union's Children's Shoe Fund, Special Olympics, Guide Dogs for the Blind, San Diego Police Memorial Fund, American and Tijuana orphanages, etc. The Imperial Court has sponsored food drives, visits to senior citizens homes, student scholarships, and dog shows! No one associated with the Imperial Court personally receives any monetary gain from any monies raised at Court sponsored benefits and events.




Throughout the last 20 years, the Imperial Court has raised countless thousands of dollars for important political and civil rights causes. 




A spectacular 70mile-long coastline provides surfing beaches, charming coves, magnificent cliffs, sheltered bays and the world class





We meet four times a year: Three Board of Directors meetings and an annual conference with workshops and seminars.






The Lesbian And Gay Men's Community Center

A year ago the San Diego city council acknowledged that the lesbian and gay community was a legitimate community deserving to be supported. In a unanimous vote the mayor and the city council awarded the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center \$600.000 for the purchase of a permanent facility.

It was a unique blend of public and private partnership and only the second time in California history that a government agency gave money for the purchase of a building to be owned by the lesbian and gay community.

The new building will be the home of 33 different community groups. There will be 12 counseling offices, an administrative suite, and both a woman's resource and multi ethnic resource Centers. There will be a lending library, drop-in Center, a large community meeting room that will hold 150-175


people, and various smaller and mid-sized group rooms. Ownership of the new building will continue the Centers' mandate to create a space that encourages and represents ethnic and cultural diversity and which allows a venue for all voices in the lesbian and gay community.

As the largest AIDS service provider in San Diego county, the Center provides groups for persons with ARC and AIDS, their partners, family members and friends. It provides training for AIDS and HIV related issues for professionals and AIDS agency personnel. And its AIDS counseling program includes services for individuals, couples,

families and groups.

In addition, the Center runs the only comprehensive lesbian health project in the County as well as the only lesbian and gay mental health agency. Overall, the Center provides services to approximately 1800 people a month, ranging from coming out groups to military counseling to providing meeting space and organizational assistance to other lesbian and gay organizations.

Major Center sponsored programs include San Diego Lesbian and Gay Pride, AIDS Walk, Lesbian and Gays of African Descent United, Gay Grads, Heartstrings, Woman's SAGA, and Labrys theatre productions. Most of the funding for the Center is for HIV related counseling services.

SAGE Seniors Active in a Gay Environment




affairs. The Visitation Committee was planned to help members who are ill, alone or confined to the home.


The public will also have the chance



membership is by calendar year at a cost of \$20 for an individual and \$30 for a household membership. A newsletter is published monthly and sent to all members.


The San Diego Women's Chorus

The Lesbian Health Project

The Lesbian Health Project (LHP) was started at the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center over a year ago. In this time, the LHP has conducted a needs assessment survey of lesbians in San Diego, done an extensive literature search on lesbian health issues, compiled written resources which we make available to health seminars attended by over 150 lesbians, and provided sensitivity and issues training to

the staff of Womancare.

Our goal in the coming year, is to have a health care referral system up and running for lesbians (similar to the Lesbian Therapists Referral source), and to broaden our networking base in the area of lesbian health to include state, national, and international organizations.

The Gay Youth Alliance

The Gay Youth Alliance is a social support group for individuals 24-years old and younger. It was formed in 1984 with the mission of providing a safe



haven for Gay, Lesbian, and bisexual youth and is still going strong after 7 years. This is an organization wholly operated by its young members, although adult advisors (Angela, Frank, Larry, and Phill) do attend meetings.


GYA's main activities are its biweekly discussion groups, currently held Fridays at 7:30 p.m. at the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center. Meetings are held on such topics as coming-out, relationships, family, and work issues.



Stepping Stone


In 1976, some very caring and loving individuals in our community saw the need for a recovery home for gays and lesbians. Through vision and hard work. **Stepping Stone** opened its doors to the communiq and since has helped thousands to surt on a new road to recovery. Today it is recognized nationwide for the unique supportive and educational environment it provides. Stepping Stone is a non-profit agency partially funded by County AIcohol Services and low resident fees with a major portion of its funding coming from community donations and fundraisers.

Stepping Stone Central Residential Recovery Service is a 34 bed, 6 to 9 month recovery home for those in need of a more structured longterm recovery environment. The program combines



Changing the conceptions of society in general is much harder but, to the extent it can, P-FLAGwill challenge





The S.O.L. group offers slightly older lesbians (40-up) an alternative to the Bar Scene The S.O.L. meeting space is





Womancare Clinic was incorporated in 1973, and has been meeting the diverse and unique health care and educational needs of women for over 18 years. They provide over 10,000 client visits per year.

Womancare's Mission Statement is: To provide a woman controlled environment that specializes in quality health care and self-help information in a nonjudgmental and respectful manner; To encourage a self-help approach to understanding our bodies in a safe, private, and comfortable setting; To advocate for reproductive freedom.



Preface to Leather

by John Keasler

The Leather community encompasses a great many lifestyles including but not limited to fetishism, SM, bondage/discipline and dominance/submission. While these are activities have been initially associated with sexuality, the Leather community recognizes that they may have significant effect on the day to day lives of their practitioners. Elements of these activities exist in all sexual and many social encounters of heterosexuals, bisexuals and homosexuals. Often described as role-playing these activities may better enable the participants to understand themselves on individual, relationship and societal levels.

Recent concern for the mental and physical health of all persons who may currently be engaged in such activities or for persons who may be novices to such activities have led to the public emergence of organized Leather support groups. Not only do these groups provide periods of social interaction but they provide non-judgmental settings where concerns of safety and health may be discussed. To the advantage of those groups is the fact that many activities such as verbal or physical control which do not involve the exchange of bodily fluids are much Usafer than traditional sexual activities. "Safe, Sane and Consensual" have become the by-words of these support groups. To the disadvantage of these groups are prejudice and misconceptions by the gay and lesbian and the heterosexual community of the willingness and motivation of Leather participants.


Although black leather has become its traditional uniform, the Leather community is not limited to those who dress in any particular style of apparel. Black leather is a symbol of rebellion, a psychological insulation against the world of societal limitations and attacks, and a symbolic nudity (inner skins worn for all the world to see). Black is the traditional representation of the hidden

side of human natures. While elements of the Leather lifestyle exist throughout human history, public emergence in the United States is a rather recent element. Censored from mainstream literature and discussion Leather is only ren. cently y finding its forum in

underground and gay publications. There are strong parallels between the social emergence or "coming out" of the homosexual and the cultural emergence of those of the Leather lifestyle. Because of their openness and their understanding of this "coming out" process, lesbians and gays are being looked to for guidance by heterosexual and bisexual participants.

In San Diego, any organized interest in the Leather community has formerly been sheltered within motorcycle clubs or exclusive cliques. The founding of a local Chapter of the National Leather Association has provided a base for support, education, and public enlightenment. Service groups such as the Center for Social Services and the Project Lifeguard have only recently begun outreach to the Leather Community. San Diego's Leatherfest, an annual weekend of workshops and social interaction, has become a significant gathering of those of the Leather lifestyle in Southern California.





Hate Crimes

Have you been assaulted, had derogatory comments yelled at you, been intimidated, had graffiti painted on your property or possessions BECAUSE OF: race, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender, age, disability or other group characteristic? If this has happened to you it is a HATE CRIME.

Many people in our community do not report hate crimes because of the fear that they will be identified as being Lesbian or Gay, or because they think it does not matter.

If you are attacked, call 911 (you do not need money to do so). After the fact, you can report directly to the police department at 531-2000 or call The Center at 692-2077 and file a hate crime report. The Center will take the report anonymously, which means that even if you are reluctant to go to the police we can keep accurate

statistics of hate crimes.

Through the grapevine we hear of many hate crimes happening somewhere, but the details are unknown. These incidents go unreported because we do not have enough details to report.

It is important to let people know where you were assaulted so that if it is a certain location that is targeted we can put the word out to the police and to our sisters and brothers. If you can get a description and direction of travel of the person(s) committing the crime it will help in police response. This way we can begin to address the problem, we will know how extensive hate crimes are and can begin to take some action to protect ourselves. We need your help to maintain our safety, report if you have been a victim of a hate crime.

Matt Wethersby was working with the senior community for



Also the police can notify the community about problems such as sex in Marion Bear park. Both groups benefit. When there is a problem both groups can communicate.

San Diego has the best relations of any lesbian & gay/police department in the country. Two officers recently came out and the police department assisted in that process. A special program for lesbian and gays focusing on personal protection has begun. Matt works for the community. Matt says "there is still more we can do and don't judge us on past relations or where you may have been from. Give us a try."

Matt can be contacted during the day, monday through friday between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at 531-2676. On wednesday nights he is at the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center from 6:00 -8:30pm. Don't wait to see him though; if a problem develops give a call as soon as possible.


