





Leslie is also past president of San Diego Women's SAGA and a softball coach for 6-9th grade students from Our Lady of the Sacred Hearts School.

Currently she works for Educational Community Insurance Services, sponsored by the California Teachers Association, providing insurance for teachers in San Diego and Imperial Counties.

Motivated by the unconditional love and continuing support of family, friends and partner, Leslie has used the following speech given by Madam Chiang Kai-Shek in the 1940s to measure and guide her dedication to all her endeavors:



Parade Grand Marshal

Sherry Harris

Sherry Harris is the first African-American woman and the first gay person elected to the Seattle City Council. She is currently the highest elected black gay official in the nation.

Sherry Harris was elected in a citywide race to Seattle City Council in November, 1991. Seattle has a population of over 500,000. She currently serves as Chair of the Council's Housing, Health, Human Services and Education Committee. She is also a member of the Council's Transportation Committee, and Utilities and Environmental Management Committee.

Sherry Harris formerly worked as an Engineer for US West Communications, She moved to Seattle in 1978. She has a Bachelor of Science from New Jersey Institute of Technology, and a Masters of Business Administration from City University. She lives in the north end of Seattle.

Sherry Harris came to the Council with a long history of active involvement in civic and community affairs. Her interests have been focused on transportation, the environment and human equity.

Harris has been involved in numerous citywide and regional quality-of-life and social issues. In ten years, she has been appointed to five separate city boards and commissions,


including stints as
Chair of the Seattle
Women's Commission and the Seattle
Design Review Advisory Committee, and
the Water Comprehensive Plan Advisory

served on the boards
of various civic and
non-profit organizations, including the

Residence 12, a facility providing rehabilitation from drug and alcohol abuse. Her political activity has included involvement in the Rainbow Coalition, the NAACP, and local Democratic and labor organizations.



Parade Grand Marshal

John Hartley



Elected to the San Diego City Council in 1989, John Hartley has set a new standard of support for gay and lesbian issues. He fought for a \$600,000 grant for the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center that allowed the organization to purchase its first permanent home. He strongly advocated the passage of the Human Dignity Ordinance and called for the City to establish its own Human Relations Commission.

In response to the increasing incidents of gay bashing and the death of John Wear, Hartley organized the Citizens Patrol last January.

By recruiting hundreds of volunteers, soliciting donations from businesses, and organizing San Diego Police for community training sessions the patrols were out on the street in two weeks.

Hartley continues to support greater protection for all minorities as seen in his recent vote for the Hate Crimes Tracking Ordinance.

Working closely with the Third District Gay and Lesbian Advisory Committee and other community representatives, John stays in touch with issues and concerns of the community and remains committed to a successful partnership.







Rainbow Flag

In 1978 the rainbow flag was first used by the San Francisco Lesbian/Gay Parade. In October of 1985 the International Association of Lesbian/Gay Pride Coordinators adopted the six striped "rainbow flag," red, orange, yellow, green, blue and purple with a white lambda in the upper left area as the official International Symbol for Lesbian and Gay Pride, representing the Gay and Lesbian People of the six populated continents.

Lambda

The lambda is the eleventh letter of the Greek lowercase alphabet, a sort of upside down twopronged check mark. In chemistry and physics the lambda symbolizes a complete exchange of energy.

In 1970 the lambda was first used as a symbol of the Gay movement by the Gay Activists Alliance of New York City. Originally it had a militant association but now it is used to signify both Lesbians and Gay men.

Pink Triangle

A pink triangle was required to be worn by Gay men who were prisoners in Nazi concentration camps. The triangle was worn on the left side of the chest. Gay men were the bottom of the prisoner hierarchy and were singled out for special tortures.

In the 1970s it was used by the Gay Activists as a readily identifiable symbol which also reminds us of a forgotten part of Gay history.

Black Triangle

Black Triangles were required to be worn by Lesbians in Nazi death camps on their prison uniforms (one tip pointing down). This symbol has become more prominent in recent years. It served the same purpose as the pink triangles worn by Gay men.





The Lesbian And Gay Men's Community Center

As The Center readies for the move to new quarters this summer, Executive director Scott Fulkerson has announced a campaign to raise the final \$50,000 necessary to complete the new facility.

The New Center at 3916 Normal Street, has come a long way since several hundred people toured the unfinished shell of the building during Open House events last spring. Metal studs now frame the walls that will divide the ground floor into offices, meeting rooms, the Drop-In Center and a performance hall that will accommodate 150 people. On the second floor are staff offices and private counseling rooms that have been carved out of what were once apartments. The original layout of the building has been creatively rearranged to meet the growing and changing needs of The Center.



The Center needs your contributions to make the move.

When completed The New Center will continue to provide the services for which it is well knownincluding Coming Out groups for gay men and lesbians, telephone referral, information and counseling, military counseling, the Speakers Bureau, the Lesbian Health Project, the AIDS response program and more. The new building on Normal Street is significantly larger than the current Center at Fifth and Robinson and will provide permanent private or shared office spaces for many community organizations. The 15 community groups which currently use The Center space for meetings will easily be accommodated

and perhaps expanded.

The Center has received more than \$800,000 from the general non-gay community in the form of City Development Block Grants, County-administered Federal Grants and donated material and labor from the OMBAC and area contractors. **Fundraising** efforts within the lesbian and gay community have intentionally been kept to a minimum so that resources could be directed toward other concerns, including AIDS and HIV.

Now is the time for our community to show support to The Center and its lesbian and gay specific concerns.

Despite toughening economic times and an increasing number of organizations vying for the same dollars, there has never before been a need as great as there is now to support The Center and its programs. The \$50,000 that is needed now will move The Center out of its cramped and counterproductive location and into a new home that can continue to grow to meet the always expanding needs of the gay and lesbian communities.

During the next three months, watch for increasing public attention in the gay and non-gay media about the programs and activities of The Center. Also, be on the lookout for direct mail appeals and appeals in the media for your financial assistance in making The New Center a reality.





We are committed to the San Diego gay and lesbian community. Many of our fund raising events, including our Annual Rodeo, benefit various AIDS organizations through our annual donations.




Travel Industry Support for AIDS



We are GLASS, and we are proud to be visible and diverse. Please join us in our efforts.



Since gay bars have been the center



ACT-UP Celebrates One Year of Pride and Power

At the 1991 San

meeting, with over 75
in attendance.

This is the third time the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power has organized in San Diego. The first two efforts apparently failed due to inaction and internal disputes, but in this case the third time is certainly the charm.

The first hurdle ACT-UP overcame was local resistance to the group's tactics. Columns and letters in Bravo!, The Reader and Update criticized the group before its first meeting, but it quickly became apparent that ACT-UP would take up causes others could not or would not.

The group has tackled head-on the issues of needle exchange for injection drug users, condom distribution in high schools, television censorship, federal government inaction in the AIDS crisis,

anti-AIDS politicians, questioning the use of funds in San Diego's AIDS community and other causes. Actions are loud and splashy, but ACT-UP affects the way organizations discuss issues, helping to shape debates rather than reacting to them.

the respect of many of
those people who
originally questioned
the group's formation. A combination
of determination,
persistance and PRIDE
in what ACT-UP does
has given the group

POWER to make a difference in fighting AIDS.

Free to be Yourself at the Bisexual Forum

The San Diego Bisexual Forum, coordinated by Dr. Regina Reinhardt, has doubled in membership in the past year. To handle the increase, a third Sunday afternoon meeting, moderated by Carl Selnick, was added to the traditional second Thursday evening program led by Dr. Reinhardt and a variety of social events. Meetings include first-time visitors who thought of themselves as heterosexual or homosexual most of their lives, but nevertheless harbor a range of attractions. Some leave confident of their traditional role and others find new answers. Other participants are bisexuals who are comfortable with their orientation. but want to know how others handle the bisexual lifestyle. Veteran members attend to share their experiences in understanding themselves and in dealing with both gay and straight friends.

Traditionally many bisexuals found it easier to adopt either a straight or gay lifestyle. But today members of the San Diego Bisexual Forum find that just limits their lives. "By taking pride in our bisexuality, we can make our lives more complete," the coordinator of the Forum, Dr. Regina Reinhardt, explained. She recalled one man saying that telling his gay friends that he was seeing a woman was more difficult than coming out the first time. "Today his gay friends are better off that he told them," Reinhardt explained. "His friends now understand that bisexuality is not just a passing phase or a fear of coming out. Plus he is free to be himself." Taking pride in their orientation allows bisexuals to take a more open and active role in the gay and lesbian community.



"After all, each bisexual has a gay side," Reinhardt emphasized. "We will always have that in common. Just a few years ago we had trouble getting even

three members to march in the Pride Parade," Reinhardt recalled. "Last year we had 17. Count us and count on us this year."



10 P.M., reopening on Sunday at noon. The Parade and Rally are free events, the Festival has an admission price and tickets may be purchased at the gate.



Linda Tillery

A leading figure among Bay area musicians since the late 1960s, Linda Tillery began her career with the Berkeley based rock band, "Loading Zone." For two decades, her repertoire has included jazz, soul, funk, gospel and pop all of which she combines in her own brand of rhythm and blues. In 1978, Tillery received the Bammy (Bay Area Music Award) for best independently produced album, as well as two Jammies (Bay Area Jazz Awards) in 1983 and 1984 for "Best Female Jazz Vocalist." Tillery has three albums which bear the stamp of a gifted and independent artist: SECRETS (1985), LINDA TILLERY (1977) and SWEET LINDA DIVINE (1970). Linda has performed and recorded with such talents as Santana, Coke Escovedo, Boz Scaggs, Sheila E. and Andy Narell. Currently performing with her own "sterling six piece R&B band," Tillery's music is sophisticated and reflects her "love of a get-down good time."





Marga Gomez

"Exotic Comedian" Marga Gomez began her career on stage with her parents: a Cuban comedian and a Puerto Rican exotic dancer. By the early '80s, Marga began to explore the comedy scene in San Francisco, quickly developing a loyal following of fans. In 1988 Gomez won the Cabaret Gold Award for "Entertainer of the Year." Gomez continued to charm fans on Rosie O'Donnel's Standup Spotlight/VH-1, on Comedy Tonight with Whoopie Goldberg and on A&E network's Good Times Cafe. In November 1990, "Memory Tricks," Gomez's first full-length performance monologue, debuted at San Diego's Multicultural Theater Festival. Gomez's most recent piece, "Marga Gomez is Pretty, Witty and Gay," is described by *The San Francisco Weekly* as "a raucous, sexual blowout..."



The Flirtations

The Flirtations are one of the hottest acappella groups in the country. Since their first street corner debut, the "Fabulous Flirtations" have been entertaining audiences across the continent with their unique blend of politics, musical artistry and humor. The Flirts have appeared on The Phil Donahue Show, Good Morning America, Night Watch and National Public Radio. Boasting a glorious ensemble sound, the Flirtations herald a new musical trend which provides a platform for emotional, political and spiritual growth.



DUECE

DUECE is a New York based jazz-fusion group headed by saxophonist Jean Fineberg and Trumpeter Ellen Seeling. Prior to forming DUECE, Seeling and Fineburg collected impressive recording and touring credits as the horn section for Sister Sledge, Laura Nyro, Luther Vandross, Chic, Cornell Dupree & Joe Cocker, Allen Toussaint and Melba Liston. Their debut album, "DUECE," highlights their melodic and driving fusion style. Seeling describes their style as "high energy music featuring Latin-influenced jazz with a bit of funk thrown in for good measure."

Tom Ammiano

Tom Ammiano, known as the "Mother of Gay Comedy," is a gay activist, educator and comedian. Tom started the Gay Teachers Coalition and a gay and lesbian speakers bureau for schools in 1975. In 1981, Ammiano began the gay comedy night at the Valencia Rose and has been on the stage ever since as an openly gay comic. Ammiano has continued to be active in community politics and has won several awards for his stance as an "out" comedian.



Earl Thomas

Earl Thomas and The Blues Ambassadors evoke an image of a different time—when the "low down dirty blues" were sung in back alleys and on street corners. Thomas' style is unique—his vocals are not an imitation of any one singer, yet there is a definite debt owed to his idol, Tina Turner. (Thomas decided he wanted to become a singer at age 11 after seeing Turner in the movie "Soul to Soul.") Named "One to Watch in 1991," Thomas has attracted the attention of several record labels. Thomas' first album, "I Sing the Blues," showcases the impressive talent of this singer/songwriter.

Lesbian Health Fair at the Festival

This year the Pride Festival will offer something to lesbians never seen before at any Festival in California (and maybe the whole country): A Lesbian Health Fair. Cosponsored by the Lesbian Health Project (part of the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center) and Womancare, the Fair will bring to San Diego Lesbians a mixture of direct physical services (blood pressure

screening, hematocrit, PAP, pelvic and breast exams) combined with consumer advocacy information, referrals and self-help tips.



Under the Big Tent, It's the Archives

The Pride events we celebrate this pride weekend commemorate the Stonewall riots. Not everybody knows about or remembers the events that are considered the beginning of the modern gay and lesbian rights movement. But there are some people trying to save lesbian and gay history in all its forms. Since 1988, the dedicated volunteers of the Lesbian and Gay Archives of San Diego have been preserving and teaching our community history.

In the largest tent at the festival this year, the Archives will present an international time line dating from 600 BC chronicling lesbian and gay history. There will be new button displays recalling San Diego events and people from the sixties to the present. Among other attractions will be several screenings of movies such as "Before Stonewall" and the "Life and Times of Harvey Milk."

The Archives has a lot of reasons to be proud. The Pride Collection is probably the biggest. One of the largest collections of its kind, it is comprised of materials that have been used in the promotion of annual Lesbian/Gay






This is the message of the AIDS


fans relate how rare it is to find beautiful and sensitive images of men together.

Of Parades and Progress

I came out on June
15, 1977; less than two
weeks later, I marched in
my first Gay and Lesbian
Pride Parade. Because

turn-out for the parade was gigantic. As we crested a hill on Fifth Avenue in New York, all I could see in front and in back of me were thousands and thousands of lesbians and gay men. My head knew they were there to fight for gay rights and gay

pride, but my heart kept saying, "How nice of all these people to march for me."

Years later, I was lucky enough to share a friend's first pride parade. This was in San Diego in 1988, and Helen Reddy was the featured performer after the march. Although my friend had been out for years, she feared being seen on TV by her coworkers, and she kept a low profile for much of the parade. But it was a glorious weekend, and the pride in the air imbued my friend with too much courage to hide. "Anyway," I told her, "there are thousands of us here—no one will ever see you on TV." When Helen Reddy sang, we were among the thousands of lesbians and gay men holding hands, swaying, and singing loud enough to (literally!) drown out airplanes.

That night on TV, sure enough, there was a close-up of my friend singing her heart out. And she was thrilled to see it!

There's nothing like a first Gay and Lesbian Pride Parade. The air shimmers, and the world feels like, for once, it belongs to us. Most importantly, being surrounded by thousands of queers extinguishes that terrible loneliness we experienced when we

feared we were the only ones on earth who were that way. And the range of people marching staggers the imagination: Dykes on Bikes, men in full drag, Christian gays, lesbian mothers, men dressed in little else than paint, women head to toe in leather, and the thousands and thousands who just look like, well, the folks next door. Except that these folks are wonderful, brave, and proud folks, out to show the world that no closet can hold them.

Of course, our parades have never been and may never be events of total joy. When we march, our ranks are filled with ghosts. But, because we have smashed open our closet doors, we have been able to come together to support and care for our loved ones. Even in dealing with death, we have traveled light years from hiding in seedy bars in bad neighborhoods. AIDS has broken our hearts, but it cannot break our spirits.

And we can never forget about our oppression. Yes, we can march,



but what about our brothers and sisters stuck in heterosexual marriages or repressive jobs or jails or psychiatric hospitals across the **United States? What** about the lesbians and gay men in countries where homosexuality is punished with death? Their oppression is our oppression, and so we must keep struggling even if our city has a gay rights law and our lives are comfortable. Until every gay man and

lesbian is free, we must keep marching.

But we also mustn't forget how far we have come, and pride celebrations offer wonderful opportunities for looking back at our incredible progress. When I marched in 1977, I couldn't imagine gay and lesbian elected officials all over the country. I couldn't imagine the gay community's vote being courted by straight politicians. I couldn't imagine celebrities coming out of the closet

and not being run out of the country. I couldn't imagine gay and lesbian characters appearing (though not frequently enough) on TV shows and in movies. I couldn't imagine changing lighted channels one night and seeing an almost ridiculously wholesomelooking Navy pilot come out on Nightline to the entire world. I think back to 1977, when the occasional article on gay issues in a newspaper was enough reason to we make history. call all my friends so that they could get copies.

Now, in many papers and magazines, our news is covered reqularly. Because of our own hard work and bravery, we are no longer invisible.

Although most gay and lesbian pride events are called Parades, I prefer to think of them as marches. We are heroes marching to tomorrow, improving the world as we go. And, at our gay and lesbian pride events, we can have fun while
