

THE SPIRIT OF STONEWALL RALLY

Rallies and protests are a strong tradition in our communities and give voice and visibility to our issues, empowering us to take matters into our own hands when no one else will hear us. We must never forget that many brave people have risked their lives and careers — and continue to do so — to construct the support systems we call community. To these people we owe great appreciation and honor.

Opposition from an organized far right, an increase of hate crimes and general apathy are serious calls to continue to motivate and organize for change. In San Diego, the rally to commemorate the 25th anniversary of Stonewall and the 20th anniversary of San Diego Pride will set the stage to help us remember our rich history and understand the urgency of our present situation in our continued fight for liberation. Some of our movement's most acclaimed leaders locally, nationally and internationally will address a crowd of thousands under the stars in front of the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center. There will be entertainment and a slide show highlighting 20 years of San Diego Pride.

Our three Grand Marshals cover unique perspectives in time and from our global community. The keynote speaker will be Morris Kight, known as "The Grandfather of the Gay and Lesbian liberation movement of the West." Joining Morris as a Grand Marshal is Peri Jude Radecic, executive director of the

National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), who has more than 15 years of experience in organizing, management and communications. Her topnotch political skills ensures the success of the NGLTF's grassroots and political efforts. In the spirit of our Global Celebration, we are honored to have Simon Tseko Nkoli, South Africa's foremost gay activist, as a Grand Marshal. His work in the anti-apartheid movement and concurrent fight against homopho-bia influenced the drafting of the interim Constitution of South Africa, making it one of only a few in the world containing specific protection for lesbian and gay people.

From our local movement, Marco Flores and Chris Kehoe are being honored as Man and Woman of the Year. Flores has worked diligently on services for Spanish speaking San Diegans with AIDS/HIV.

Founder of PACTO, Latino AIDS Organization, he and the organization recently secured a residential home for Latino/a PWA's. Chris Kehoe made history by becoming our city's first elected openly lesbian City Councilperson — one of only a handful in this nation. She continues to bring our communities' issues to the forefront in ways they have never been before.

Nicole Ramirez Murray will receive the Lifetime Achievement Award. A part of San Diego's movement since the early '70s and National Co-Chair for Stonewall 25, Nicole has founded numerous organizations in the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered and AIDS/HIV communities. He has helped raise tens of thousands of dollars for these and other underrepresented groups.

On hand to receive Community Service Awards will be Vertez Burks, Renee Richetts, Scott Fulkerson and a representative in honor of the late Jim Cua. Larry Baza, Pride board member and executive director of El Centro Cultural de la Raza will emcee.





SHEMM

Performing in the San Diego and Tijuana area since 1992, Shemm is a multi-talented young choreographer, bilingual composer, dancer, singer, and actor who has won the hearts of many people of all ages.

THE FLIRTATIONS

In six short years, these exuberant doowoppers have skyrocketed from singing on the streets of New York to concert tours, radio and television appearances, and, most recently, their film debut in Jonathan Demme's Philadelphia. The 20th annual Pride Parade kicks off at the corner of University Avenue and Normal Street traveling west on University cheered by a crowd of over 40,000 spectators. The 150 plus contingent parade moving through the heart of Hillcrest will feature honorees, marching bands and floats encompassing our theme "Never Ever Forget."

MORRIS KIGHT

A Living Forefather

The gay liberation movement is long on recollections and short on living history. San Diego Lesbian and Gay Pride is proud to have Morris Kight as a Grand Marshal for the 1994 Pride Parade.


Known as a principal architect and founder of gay liberation in 1969, Kight was not only a crusader for gay and lesbian rights but a activist for peace, environmentalism and humanism. As a younger man, Kight worked on the early integration projects at the University of Texas.

Arriving in Los Angeles in 1957, he began his career as a self-described "underground gay-liberationist," establishing and coordinating one-to-one services for many homosexuals in the areas of housing, employment, counseling, legal assistance and health care.

The 1970s brought

Kight into the forefront of a burgeoning gay and lesbian movement, becoming the leading force and spokesperson for the Gay Liberation Front of Los Angeles. He was pivotally involved with the founding of the Los Angeles Gay Pride Committee; the principal founder of the Van Ness Recovery House in May 1993, the first such activity for lesbian and gay persons with substance abuse problems; and the Venereal Disease Clinic of Los Angeles' Gay Community Services Center.

Perhaps Kight is most noted as the co-founder — in May of 1971 — of the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center



of Los Angeles, which has become a national model for such endeavors. The LA Center is the largest such social service organization in the world.

Auspiciously, Kight is the founder — in October of 1985 — and first president of Stonewall 25, the International Celebration of Lesbian and Gay Pride, to commemorate two-and-one-half decades of non-violent gay and lesbian liberation.

Currently Kight presides over the McCadden Place Collection, a program of the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center in Los Angeles. The Collection consists of over 1500 exhibitable posters, prints, paintings, photographs and sculptures which celebrate gay liberation and many other self-determination movements. Since 1982 a growing number of AIDS related pieces have become part of the collection.

Ever still the activist, Kight serves on the Los Angeles County Human Relations Commission as well as on the Board of Directors of Aunt Bea's, Stonewall Democratic Club and the Asian/Pacific Lesbian and Gays organization and is the author of Lambda Gray, an emotional and spiritual guide for lesbians and gays who are growing older.

The Board and Staff of Lesbian and Gay Pride are proud to have Morris Kight with us this year.






PERI JUDE RADECIC

As we celebrate San Diego's 20th Anniversary Lesbian and Gay Pride Parade, and Stonewall 25, it is a great honor and privilege to have a national leader at the forefront of the civil rights movement, Peri Jude Radecic, as one of our Grand Marshals. Radecic is the executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) and organized NGLTF's National Lobby Days during the 1987 March on Washington. She developed its "report cards" on congressional voting records. She moved on to become NGLTF's first legislative director, and in 1991, was promoted to deputy director of public policy, where she developed and managed Task Force programming. She was appointed with an unanimous vote to be executive director of public policy by NGLTF's board of directors at its fall meeting in 1993, and she took helm of the Task Force on November 1. She has worked with the Department of Justice on the implementation of the nation-wide data collection effort and was a central figure in winning enactment of the Hate Crime Statistics Act. Radecic's more than 15 years of experience in organizing, management and communications, and her top-notch political skills, ensures the success of

NGLTF's grassroots and political efforts and gives a firm grounding to the Task Force's new program priorities. Among the new programming priorities at the core of NGLTF's work are health policy — with a focus on lesbian health care and AIDS — campus and workplace organizing, state and local civil rights organizing and strengthening our community's response to the increasing threat from the far right. Before joining NGLTF, Radecic directed the Lesbian Rights Program of the National Organization for Women, which worked to repeal sodomy laws in state legislatures. Radecic was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania where she grew up. A graduate in rhetoric and communication from the University of Pittsburgh, Radecic is also known for her outstanding career as an All-American collegiate discus thrower.



TSEKO SIMON NKOLI

The choice of South Africa's foremost gay activist as a Grand Marshal for this year's Gay Pride parade is a coup for San Diego. The presence of Tseko Simon Nkoli will emphasize the theme of this year's festival, "A Global Celebration of Pride and Protest." Simon has a unique history in the struggle against oppression. His story may point to new ways in which the gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered and transsexual communities can join with others in securing human rights for all.

Since high school Simon has embodied "pride and protest." Like many South Africans, his commitment as a community activist began with the struggle against apartheid. A child of the Soweto uprising in 1976, Simon and other students staged massive protests against the forced teaching of Afrikans in the curriculum. In the repression which followed, many fled to join the African National Congress (ANC) in exile. Of those who remained, any who spoke out were imprisoned without trial. Many "disappeared" or "slipped" down stairs or out of windows during interrogation at the notorious prison in John Forster Square in Johannesburg.

By 1984 Simon was working with the Education Support Program, a large scale after school tutoring program to upgrade the inferior education given to black South Africans under apartheid. After hours he was busy organizing in the gay community in and around Johannesburg. He was a founding member of the Gay Association of South Africa (GASA) and the Saturday Group, an

intercultural gay group which met in the township of Soweto.

In 1984, residents of the black townships outside Iohannesburg revolted against government imposed rent increases. In pitched battles against police and the army which lasted for days, hundreds were shot including Simon's friend, Joseph Sithole. Thousands were tear gassed, beaten or whipped and imprisoned without charges. After speaking at Sithole's funeral, Simon was arrested, tortured and put in solitary confinement for almost a year with 21 other activists. All were part of the United Democratic Front, the largest legal anti-apartheid organization in the country, became known as the Delmas 22. In the largest show trial since Nelson Mandela's trial in 1960, Simon was charged with "murder, subversion and treason" — offense punishable with the death penalty.

Simon spent three years in prison until his acquittal on all charges in 1988. During this time he was subjected to the homophobic attacks of several of his fellow prisoners, some of whom like Patrick L. Lekota and Popo Molefe are in the governing body of the ANC. But Simon persevered and turned these attitudes around. It's no accident that the current interim constitution in South Africa is the only one in the world which contains specific protection for lesbian and gay people. In January 1994, Simon received sufficient votes to be listed as an ANC candidate in the national elections in April. He was the first openly gay candidate in the history of South Africa to do so.

Following his release from prison, Simon helped found a non-racial gay group, the Gay and Lesbian Organization of Witwatersrand (GLOW) and is its current co-chair. In 1990 he began work with the Township AIDS Project in Soweto and is active in his local branch of the ANC. He is in the U.S. to attend celebrations for Stonewall and raise funds for GLOW.





MAN OF THE YEAR MARCOFLORES

Born in Mexico, Marco Flores came to San Diego at the age of eight. He attended Chula Vista High School and San Diego State University, where he earned a baccalaureate degree. A Master's of Public Administration degree was earned at National University. Marco has served the San Diego HIV/ AIDS community since June of 1987, when the County of San Diego's Community Health Department hired him for the position of HIV Counselor. Because of his position with the County and through his volunteer efforts at the San Diego AIDS Project, Marco had the opportunity to assess the disproportionate impact of the AIDS epidemic on the Latino community and the relatively lower HIV/AIDS education rates among monolingual Latinos. In order to address these issues, Marco founded PACTO Latino AIDS Organization in September of 1991. PACTO, primarily an outreach organization, utilizes lin-

guistically and culturally appropriate means to provide prevention/treatment and educational information to the monolingual Latino community. 1994 will prove to be another successful year for PACTO, as the organization has secured federal funding to offer much-needed services in addition to outreach education. Through the Ryan White CARE Act, PACTO will receive funding for a residential AIDS shelter (RAS) and a part-time case manager. The RAS, scheduled for a summer 1994 opening, will provide both shelter and food for persons with AIDS who cannot access public assistance programs. The part-time case manager will specifically address the needs of the transgendered, HIV-infected community.

Please join us in honoring Marco Flores, a true leader of the lesbian/gay and HIV/AIDS communities.

WOMAN OF THE YEAR CHRISTINE KEHOF

Councilmember Christine Kehoe was recently elected to represent the Third Council District and became the first elected openly lesbian or gay city official in San Diego's history. She has been chosen Women of the Year for the 1994 San Diego Lesbian and Gay Pride events. Her selection was based not only on the achievement of her election, but in recognition of her long history of activism in not only the gay and lesbian community but the community in which she lives.

Kehoe first became involved in the gay and lesbian community as the editor of the *Gayzette* newspaper. She had long worked on feminist causes and had formerly been the editor of *Longest Revo-*

lution. Her political experience began when she managed the city council campaign of Neil Good, who ran for District Eight as an openly gay candidate, narrowly missing the run-off.

Kehoe went on to take the post as director of the Hillcrest Business Association and helped guide the resurgence of its popular street fair.

Kehoe next honed her legislative skills as a member of then-Councilmember John Hartley's staff. When Hartley de-



cided not to seek a second term, Kehoe was ready for the challenge.

Her community activism has always included work on gay and lesbian pride events. Kehoe joined the reformed board in 1989 and was key to revitalizing the parade and festival. She has seen the event grow from a small demonstration to an event that brings thousands of people from all over the state to enjoy as entire weekend of events, "The event has always had the potential that it now shows, it is the most meaningful gathering for our community."

For Kehoe, San Diego Pride has always been an important event, especially because it is a time when the entire community comes together. "It transcends all

the political affiliations — there's a role for everyone," she said.

Chris Kehoe has proven through her involvement that one person really can make a difference. The Pride Board would like to thank Chris for all of her work and dedication throughout the years and is proud to name her San Diego Lesbian and Gay Pride Woman of the Year.




COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT VERTEZ BURKS


Prior to living in the Virgin Islands, Burks was a Peace Corps volunteer stationed in Liberia, West Africa where she taught elementary school.



COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT

JAMES MITSUO CUA

(APRIL 21, 1961 - MAY 22, 1994)

James Mitsuo Cua was a successful community activist for 10 years. He got his start in community service in 1984 at the age of 23, when he started working with the San Diego Democratic Club. Since then, Cua has successfully founded numerous groups and served as a bridge between diverse communities. When he learned he was HIV positive in 1985, Cua became more determined to "make a difference" and moved from making coffee at Democratic Club meetings to becoming the program director in 1985. In 1989, he helped found another Democratic Club, the Harvey Milk Democratic Club. In recent years, he was a founding member of the newly-charted Asian-Pacific Democratic Club. Cua was immensely dedicated to his communities: to Filipinos, Asian Pacific Islanders, people of

color, gays and lesbians and particularly to those who inhabited two or more of those communities. In 1988, Cua led one of San Diego's first forums on racism among gays and lesbians. This forum resulted in the for-



mation of GLASS (Gay and Lesbian Asian Social Support), which Cua founded later that year. With GLASS' success, in 1989 the San Diego's Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center asked Cua to help establish a similar group for African Americans. Cua pulled leaders and community members together and helped them start LAGADU (Lesbians and Gays of African Descent United). In 1989, he organized the first gay and lesbian contingent in San Diego's annual Martin Luther King, Jr., Parade. True to his desire to work for social justice, Cua was also an advocate of feminist issues. He served as a security escort for the WomanCare Health Clinic for many years. Cua was actively in-

The Children's Garden




large. They are pleased to announce that they have been asked to return for the second year.

Herron-Sweet

It was the spring of 1991, and the Herron-Sweets were basking in the tropical breezes of their home on Kauai. As the pastoral team of two small churches on the island, they had come to love their home and the people. All that was to change on July 1 with their appointment to Pacific Beach United Methodist Church in San Diego. The church was looking for some innovative leadership and the Herron-Sweets were called upon to meet the challenge.

Known for their organizational skills and energy, April and Andy led the church through major changes. Everything from worship style to the physical plant was subject to major renovation and the Herron-Sweets completed each task with flair.

Then, in the summer of 1993, the pastoral team poised themselves to take a giant leap. Knowing that a significant number of their parishioners and friends were lesbian and gay, April and Andy decided to approach the issue of full inclusion in all elements of the church's ministry. They didn't see this as an "issue." The Herron-Sweets felt that people they knew and loved deserved to be fully included in the life of the church. They started by listing two male couples together in the church directory. When several members shared an interest in becoming involved in the process, the pastoral team supported a congregational meeting with Mark Bowman from the reconciling ministries program. Follow-up meetings with the Administrative Council led to a six-week forum on "Homosexuality and

the Church." The forum became an example and incentive for other churches to also undertake a study.

The Herron-Sweets have also conducted services of union for lesbian and gay couples. They feel that it is important to support committed and loving relationships and to celebrate that joy with the entire church family. Thanks to the hard work of the Herron-Sweets, Pacific Beach United Methodist Church



is "out of the closet" with its welcoming position regarding inclusion of all people in the fellowship of God.

There have also been some serious challenges for April and Andy. Although a majority of the church has been excited about the changes, there

have been some serious sacrifices along the way. Several influential members left the church over the inclusion issue as well as the services of union. There were times when it would have been financially and "politically" more prudent for the Herron-Sweets to take a position of compromise. When asked why she kept going, April responded, "I had to keep my ministry in line with the Gospel message. John 3:17 states that God sent Jesus not to condemn the world, but that the world through Christ might be saved."

The Herron-Sweets remain busy raising their two children, ministering to the congregation and working with persons with AIDS through the "Strength for the Journey" program. Stop by PBUMC sometime to see and experience the warmth of this great couple and their welcoming congregation.



REVOLUTION BY TEENY-TINY STEPS

Since those wonderful pissed-off people at Stonewall fought back, the world has changed! There are dozens of gay and lesbian elected officials and gay rights laws. The relationship of two men is treated as the epitome of love in Four Weddings and a Funeral. Daily papers include lesbians and gay men in stories on politics, families and social trends. "Northern Exposure" features a gay wedding. Gigantic bookstore chains include gay and lesbian books. Maybe your parents even hugged your lover the last time they visited.

Of course, this list could be countered with the TV shows and movies that insult us, the newspapers that attack us, the bookstores that ignore us, the states that consider us criminals and the parents who can't remember our lover's name even though we've been together ten years.

But it's Gay Pride time, so let's bask in our successes and they are our successes. It's an odd revolution we fight, with no guns and minimal violence, with no Berlin Wall to topple or legal apartheid to overthrow and with few recognized leaders and no commander-in-chief. Instead, we have a revolution of teeny-tiny steps.

Did you enjoy the "Roseanne" "kiss" episode? Congratulations! You made that show possible by coming out to your kid sister.

Do you feel safer in a world with at least some gay rights laws? Congratulations. You made those laws happen by voting and writing letters and picketing.

President Clinton publicly released a letter in which he came out against anti-gay ballot initiatives. Congratulations. You helped him dare to be pro-gay by being open with your

You've probably heard that extended saying, "For want of a nail, the shoe was lost; for want of a shoe, the horse was lost; for want of a horse, the rider was lost; for want of a rider, the message was lost; for want of a message, the war was lost, and all because of a nail." Our lesbian and gay and bisexual and transgendered revolution is the reverse of that: "Because we come out, a consciousness is raised; because a consciousness is raised, a story is told; because a story is told, a message is sent; because a message is sent, a law is passed; because a law is passed, a life is saved — and all because we

In our revolution of teeny-tiny steps, we celebrate large battles like the Stonewall rebellion of 1969, but let's not forget the years before Stonewall when being openly gay could quickly end your job and even your life, yet a handful of people peacefully picketed the White House. Others started organizations like the Daughters of Bilitis and hundreds of courageous queers strutted past glowering cops to go to lesbian and gay dances.

From then to now, our revolution has been fought by millions of self-appointed foot soldiers. How many people wrote letters and picketed and made noise before politicians started listening?

How many people called TV stations to demand better

depictions of gays before Roseanne Arnold could even think to have a lesbian episode? How many of us came out to relatives before popular opinion started to agree that maybe we are human? Millions—and every action was indispensable.

Jayne came out in a class she teaches, making a student's self-acceptance process much easier. Liz came out at work, paving the way for others to be open. Holly worked hard to understand her lesbian sister, and now she's ready to be a supportive mom should one of her kids be gay. Dennis didn't allow an anti-gay joke to be told and sent the message that hatred is not acceptable. The Grand Canyon was carved into the earth by millions of individual drops of water. We are those individual drops, carving out freedom in a rocky world.

On TV, Melissa Etheridge complained to Arsenio Hall that most talk show hosts don't use the "L" word. Arsenio said, "You mean I should say lesbian?" Melissa answered, "Yes, say lesbian." And they sat on national TV, gleefully repeating, "Lesbian. Lesbian. Lesbian."

Our revolution lacks Nathan Hale's "My only regret is that I have but one life to give for my country" and Patrick Henry's "Give me liberty or give me death." Instead, we have Melissa Etheridge and Arsenio Hall saying, "Lesbian. Lesbian. Lesbian.

What a great revolution!

As she remembers that night she was, "listening to WBAI in New York City, the Stevie Post show [an all night program]. He broadcast live coverage from the riot. What impressed me ... this was the first time I heard somebody being proud to be gay. In the same context. I stayed up all night and listened I didn't go to sleep! I was so excited. I didn't really know anyone who was gay."

For Reif it was an awakening of her own identity as a lesbian.

She continues, "It had a tremendous impact on me. This is when I decided that I was lesbian and decided to come out. I had had my first lesbian experience at the age of 12 and had another at age 13. I didn't initiate these. I thought it was always the other girl who initiated and that was her idea. I liked it a whole lot and it was a good idea, but I didn't think it meant me. Then I fell in love with my best friend in high school.

"By our senior year, she wanted us to become lovers, and I said, 'No, I couldn't do that.' And I was truly in love with her. That was really a great loss to me. I didn't know that gay meant me until that night [of Stonewall].

"During July, WBAI had lots and lots of first hand coming out testimony. People who said, 'Hi, I'm so and so and I'm a lesbian.' I actually knew somebody that I heard on

the radio who came out. It took me a few weeks — from June 28 through all of July until the beginning of August — then I went to a Gay Liberation Front meeting. I joined the groups of people who would go down to the Village. Up until this point [it was unusual] especially [for] women, to go that far west towards the docks where there was a lot of anonymous cruising by gay men at night. Certainly no one went there in the

daytime. Troops of people walked past the riot site.

"People had their mouths open over the fact that anyone had done this. There was such an excitement.

"I found out afterwards that there were drag queens and drag kings in the bar. It was predominantly a people of color bar — a lot of Puerto Rican drag queens who fought back.



The police coming into the bar and harassing the clientele and the vice squad coming in and checking IDs, didn't stop then. That went on for years afterward. I experienced that personally after coming out and going to the bars. But the attitude changed. Up until Stonewall everybody felt like they had done somthing wrong just by being in the bar. That they should feel guilty that they were breaking the law and being someone who was not ac-


cepted by society. Or in my case, and the experience of a lot of other women, someone who didn't even exist."

Reif became involved in the organization and planning of the first event that commerated the Stonewall riot, a march in New York City in June of 1970.

"I don't know who the committee was that organized the march itself, but the Gay Liberation Front and other community groups participated heavily in shaping the nature of the march. [They] were very insistent that this not be a parade, that the march be political. [And] that all the signs have some political comment on them. After we had tons of meetings and determined that the march and all our signs would be political, the only things that people said were: 'Come Out!' There was no concept of gay rights or civil rights in those days. Just being there on the street was a major political statement."

As for the events of 1994, Reif says:

"This is my holiday! It's a thrill, I love how our community has matured. I love how we've accepted all the different seg-



ments of our community. How we haven't tried to make us be just one single viewpoint or one single voice. I love it that we've come so far in our pride that we can celebrate ourselves.

"That first year [1970 in New York] no one knew what was going to happen. No one knew if we'd get down Sixth Avenue without violence or riots. We didn't know what to expect. We didn't know how the media would view us. We didn't know if everybody in the march would lose jobs as a result of being seen. We didn't know what to do about the fact that the press could photograph us. We could wind up in the papers.

"It was the longest march I had ever seen, and I marched all through the '60s in civil rights marches. It was in the thousands and it went on forever. We marched from the Village across Sixth Avenue to Central Park. When we got to Central Park the march stopped at the top of a hill. There were no plans for the rest of the afternoon, but everybody who got to the top of the hill and got to look down on the throngs of people marching into the park. That just made our day! Nothing else needed to happen. That was our festival and our rally!"

Stonewall Award For Community Service By An Organization

IMPERIAL COURT

On Friday, July 15 during the "Spirit of Stonewall Rally," San Diego's Imperial Court will be presented with the "Stonewall Award of Community Service by an Organization."

The rally begins at 8pm, at the corner of Normal Street and University Avenue in front of The Center.

The San Diego chapter of the Imperial Court dates back to 1972 when the first coronation was held at a hotel on the Embarcadero. The event attracted about 1,000 people, including several local politicians and community leaders.

Since then, the Court is responsible for tens of thousands of dollars raised each year for a wide range of charities, including the Harvey Milk/Tom Homman Memorial Scholarship Fund, founded in 1979 by reigning empress Nicole Ramirez-Murray. Over the last three years the fund has dispensed over \$25,000 to gays and lesbians for college scholarships.

The San Diego Imperial Court has donated to out-of-state causes as well. For instance, it was the first organization on the West Coast to provide money to fight Anita Bryant's 1977 anti-gay referendum.

Today, the Court uses its bipartisan muscle to help every type of cause, from political to social. It has definitely become a powerful fundraising machine that is recognized throughout the United States.

TWENTY YEARS OF PRIDE

It seems like a long time ago that 400 of us marched through downtown San Diego, up Sixth Avenue and sat on the grass in Balboa Park to hear speakers talk about gay and lesbian rights. The year was 1975. It was the first celebration of gay and lesbian pride in San Diego.

Yet, sometimes it seems like it was just last week that we began this adventure of liberation.

As I hear stories about Stonewall and read — yes, now we can read about our history — the memories of my first march come back very clearly.

Even though I am a native of San Diego, I was living in Philadelphia in 1972. The word of Stonewall and the events of that June 28 in 1969 had reached us by word of mouth. It's amazing to realize that in those early days we did not have the

In the fall of 1971 a group of 14 activists in Philly decided to have a march commemorating Stonewall in June of '72, inspired by one of the organizers of the first march in New York which was held in 1970.

We didn't know what to expect. We had no network of community organizations to help spread the word of this unique, and some thought crazy, idea – to march through the main streets of Philadelphia. But we were determined. We spent every weekend going to bars and clubs and small meetings of fledgling organizations. People said: "You want to do what?" They gasped. They laughed. They told us to go away. But many listened. They were ready to hear the message of Stonewall. You don't have to be afraid to be gay or lesbian anymore.

And march we did. Up until the day of the event the 14 original planners had no idea what to expect. Would anyone show up? Would we be attacked? Would the police harass us? It was with no small amount of fear that I went to the staging area for the parade that morning.

The park was quiet. The hour drew near for the beginning of the rally that would kick off the parade. From my vantage point I could not see if anyone was coming into the park. Another committee member, who was standing on the stage, helped me up to see what he saw. Every street coming in to the park was full of people! As we began to march through town, heading for Independence Mall, the people in the streets were joined by more from the sidewalk, who had come only to watch but couldn't resist the power of Stonewall. Over four

thousand marched that day.

Within two years, I returned to San Diego, amazed to find that we had a Center. And that a committee had formed to plan the first gay/lesbian pride celebration in my home town. I joined them. We had to struggle with a city administration that knew little of community demonstrations. The police here did not even have a unit for civil disobedience. The activism of the '60s and early '70s had not touched San Diego!

There were organizations, Metropolitan Community Church and The Center, which served as focal points for dissemination of information. Gay and lesbian liberation was coming to San Diego. Prior to 1975 anyone wishing to celebrate our pride traveled to Los Angeles or San Francisco. Now, we would have our own parade.

It was a small group of marchers — by today's standards — that showed up at Hobo Park in Downtown San Diego to celebrate that first day. We gathered in front of the old location of BJ's. It was a long walk east on Broadway, north on Sixth to Balboa Park. At a natural amphitheater beneath the shade of eucalyptus trees, we were grateful to sit on the grass and hear speakers talk of dreams and a future for us as gay and lesbian people.

Alan Spier was there as one of our first Grand Marshals. He was the first openly gay legislator in the country to come out. Today he has risen to become the leader of the state senate in Minnesota. Our other Grand Marshal was Barbara Gittings, one of the people who bravely picketed the White House in 1965! We heard from many people that day and as the last speaker finished, the crowd was not ready to leave. Spontaneously we started to sing. People came forward and

joined the organizers and speakers in a line of embraces that became a huge circle of pride.

There are many memories in twenty-five years of pride since Stonewall. I was not there, but the spirit of that weekend of 1969 touched my life. The energy from that spark rippled out all over the country. Pride events are held in every major American city and in many European sites. However, some places have yet to have their first parade. And, we have seen just this year in Mississippi that bigotry and prejudice are still with us.

We can "Never, ever forget."





She also decided to march, alone except for her son, in the Gay Pride Parade that year. She carried a placard which read, "Parents of Gays, Unite in Support of Our Children."

At first she thought roars of approval she heard were for Dr. Spock, the famous baby doctor and activist who was marching behind her with some Viet Nam veterans. But the cheers were for her. Young gay men and lesbians ran up to her, hugged her and begged her to talk to their parents.

Then and there Jean Manford decided to form a support group and is now considered the Mother of P-FLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays). Hundreds of other such volunteer groups — groups helping to keep families together and feeling proud — sprang up all over the country.

The San Diego County Chapter began in 1982 through the efforts of Lillian Rubin who now lives in Oceanside. Diane Warner is the current president. The group meets in San Diego the fourth Monday of each month at 7pm at the First Unitarian Universalist Church in Hillcrest and in Carlsbad the second Sunday of the month at 2pm at the Pilgrim United Church of Christ. Over the years, P-FLAG has become known as a safe and friendly place where troubled parents and others can go to get support and good information. Many are surprised to learn they are not alone — that they are part of a very large human family. They can take the opportunity to learn some of the basic facts about lesbian, gay and bisexual people and unlearn some of the myths.

Assured of confidentiality, parents find they can talk freely about this previously taboo subject, and this alone makes it less scary and mysterious. They can voice their concerns and feelings in an atmosphere of warmth and understanding. P-FLAG is a place where changes in attitude can and do happen.

But P-FLAG is not just for parents and friends. Gay men and lesbians, in or out of the closet, attend these meetings and interact with both supportive and in-process parents. Everybody can see and better understand what their own family members are going through. Parents and gay people frequently seem to be surrogates for one another.

Gay and lesbian people are important to P-FLAG in still another way. Besides being very welcome at general meetings, they can — and presently do — serve on the board and help run most functions of the group. Actually, without the assistance of the gay community most P-FLAG chapters would be struggling organizationally.

In addition to its support and informational meetings, its free literature, lending library and monthly newsletter, P-FLAG is also active in the struggle for full civil and human rights for gay, lesbian and bisexual people.



Lesbianism. Ten years of lesbian activism, right here in San Diego! And we're here to celebrate it with a festival, a parade and some thought, I hope.

We *should* celebrate these past ten years of struggle and grassroots organizing—the successes and the sisterhood we have created.

We should celebrate the energy we have put into our discussions of race, class, power, separatism, motherhood and physical abilities —a few of the issues we tackled in the course of producing our events.

We should celebrate some important organizations and businesses that a handful of women put together and we all enjoyed: The Women's Bookstore, Las Hermanas, Wing Cafe, Charmed Circle Books, Feminists Communication and Thursday's Child. These places and publications helped create a sense of community and culture that still lingers.

We should celebrate the organizations that our untried but ardent political ideals gave rise to: Lesbians for Political Action, Lesbians of Color and Lesbran Solidarity. All were true community groups that attempted to accomplish large events with no money, experience or connections—and sometimes did!

Maybe we would rather wince and look the other way when we read about the defeat of AB-1. Or maybe we could try ignoring altogether the surprise attack on Hillcrest by right-wing homophobes—that parade that left some of us feeling like hit and run victims. Maybe we should chalk up our still struggling Lesbian and

Gay Men's Community Center to lack of leadership. And what about the women's spaces that San Diego lesbians once had at their disposal?

Perhaps, now it is time for a renewed approach. At this Celebration '84 we can recommit ourselves to our original goals.

We can truly celebrate our tenth anniversary by recommitting our energy, finances and resources to the advancement of lesbian rights. We can recommit ourselves to voting twice this year-in June and in November. We can recommit ourselves to writing a check to a lesbian organization today. Regardless of whether it is the Women's Caucus at the Democratic Club, the Lesbian Rights Task Force at NOW, the new publication, As The Shoe Fits or your favorite rugby team—DO IT! They are all important! We can and must recommit ourselves to voicing our agenda within the gay men's and feminist communities.

We can, perhaps most radically, recommit ourselves to empowering all lesbians and listening to each other with utterly open minds.

Nicole Ramirez-Murray is among the scores of San Diegans who have revolutionized the social and political climate for lesbians and gays.

Having shown over 25 years of political loyalty to San Diego, he will be presented with this year's Lifetime Achievement Award during the "Spirit of Stonewall Rally" at 8pm, Friday, July 15. The event will be held on Normal Street and University Avenue in front of The

A political activist at heart, Nicole represented San Diego twice for March on Washington events and served as co-chair this year for the Stonewall 25 celebration.

To some he is known as one of San Diego's foremost drag entertainers and the driving force behind the popular Dreamgirls Revue. His presence as empress of San Diego's Imperial Court has made him a distinctly visible luminary within the community.

His quest in local gay politics began in the early '70s with a small grass routes organization called the Gay Lib-

eration Front. Nicole recalls it was comprised of only five or six people who circulated fliers that simply carried a peaceful gay message.

tens of thousands of dollars throughout the '70s.

In 1977 he founded the Gay Activist Alliance, which grew to sup-

port state assembly and city council candidates. He was also a founder of the Teddy Roosevelt Club, Harvey Milk Democratic Club, Gay and Lesbian Latinos con Orgullo and the Nicky Awards.

His effective approach has particularly made a positive impact on the AIDS crisis. He is the founder of the San Diego AIDS Assistance Fund, co-founder of the People of Color AIDS Survival Effort and was appointed by the county Board of Supervisors to the Regional Task Force on AIDS to serve as chair of its minorities and AIDS committee.

Nationally, he has served on the executive boards of the Gay Rights National Lobby and the Human Rights Campaign Fund. In 1987 he was honored at the French Embassy in Washington, D.C. by the national AIDS Net-

work for his leadership in AIDS organizations.




